Definitions of "Atone" as a verb

- *Turn away from sin or do penitence.*
- *Make amends or reparation.*
- *Make amends for.*



Synonyms of "Atone" as a verb (16 Words)

aby	Make amends for.
abye	To pay the penalty for (an offence); to atone for, suffer for, make amends for, expiate (a crime, one's sins, another's guilt, etc.).
answer	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>A few words would answer.</i>
<u>compensate</u>	Make payment to compensate. <i>He will be richly compensated for his efforts.</i>
expiate	Make amends or reparation for (guilt or wrongdoing). <i>Their sins must be expiated by sacrifice.</i>
make amends	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

make recompense	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages.
make redress	Be or be capable of being changed or made into.
make reparation	Gather and light the materials for.
make restitution	Amount to.
make up for	Institute, enact, or establish.
pay	Bring in. <i>It pays to choose varieties carefully.</i>
pay the penalty	Discharge or settle.
pay the price	Cancel or discharge a debt.
recompense	Make amends to (someone) for loss or harm suffered; compensate. <i>I will recompense their iniquity.</i>
repent	Feel regret or penitence about. <i>I repent me of all I did.</i>



Usage Examples of "Atonement" as a verb

- A human sacrifice to atone for the sin.



Associations of "Atonement" (30 Words)

- apologetic** Offering or expressing apology.
*An **apologetic** note.*
- atonement** The action of making amends for a wrong or injury.
*An annual ceremony of confession and **atonement** for sin.*
- commit** Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee.
*She **committed** herself to the work of God.*
- compensate** Make payment to compensate.
*He will be richly **compensated** for his efforts.*

confession	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>Proof of this crime must be established by confession.</i>
contrition	(in the Roman Catholic Church) the repentance of past sins during or after confession. <i>Prayers of contrition.</i>
counterbalance	(of a weight) balance (another weight). <i>The sitter s weight counterbalances the tilting pressure on the backrest.</i>
expiate	Make amends or reparation for (guilt or wrongdoing). <i>Their sins must be expiated by sacrifice.</i>
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I was willing to forgive all her faults for the sake of our friendship.</i>
guilt	Make someone feel guilty especially in order to induce them to do something. <i>Celeste had been guilted into going by her parents.</i>
guilty	Conscious of, affected by, or revealing a feeling of guilt. <i>A guilty look.</i>
misdeed	A wicked or illegal act. <i>His past misdeeds were forgiven.</i>
offense	The action of attacking an enemy.
offset	Create an offset in. <i>A present of tulip bulbs offsets and seeds for his garden.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>The Bishop penanced him severely for his conduct.</i>
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
penitent	A person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor). <i>A penitent expression.</i>
penitential	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. <i>Wrote a penitential letter apologizing for her hasty words.</i>
regret	Express with regret. <i>I regret I can t come to the party.</i>
regretful	Feeling or expressing regret or sorrow or a sense of loss over something done or undone. <i>Regretful over mistakes she had made.</i>

<u>remorse</u>	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i>
remorseful	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>The defendant was remorseful for what he had done.</i>
repent	View or think of (an action or omission) with deep regret or remorse. <i>I repent me of all I did.</i>
<u>repentance</u>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.</i>
repentant	Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds. <i>He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
rue	Repentance; regret. <i>With rue my heart is laden.</i>
<u>salvation</u>	A means of preserving from harm or unpleasantness. <i>His only salvation was to outfly the enemy.</i>
<u>sin</u>	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. <i>He committed the unforgivable sin of refusing to give interviews.</i>
<u>sinner</u>	A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
transgression	The action of going beyond or overstepping some boundary or limit. <i>Few ministers now stand down because of sexual transgressions.</i>
