| effecting | An outward appearance. |
| fulfilment | The achievement of something desired, promised, or predicted. <i>Winning the championship was the fulfilment of a childhood dream.</i> |
| <u>mastery</u> | Power to dominate or defeat. <i>A child s mastery of language.</i> |
| proficiency | Skillfulness in the command of fundamentals deriving from practice and familiarity. <i>He demonstrated his proficiency in Chinese.</i> |
| qualification | The qualification stage of a sporting event. <i>The five year residency qualification for presidential candidates.</i> |
| realization | The achievement of something desired or anticipated. <i>A growing realization of the need to create common economic structures.</i> |
| skill | The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>Difficult work taking great skill.</i> |

| gain | Increase (one's body weight). <i>The home team was gaining ground.</i> |
| honored | Having an illustrious reputation; respected. |
| jubilation | The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of jubilation.</i> |
| meritorious | (of an action or claim) likely to succeed on the merits of the case. <i>The costs involved in civil litigation may prevent a meritorious appeal.</i> |
| monumental | Of outstanding significance. <i>It s been a monumental effort.</i> |
| notable | Widely known and esteemed. <i>The gardens are notable for their collection of magnolias and camellias.</i> |
| outshine | Attract more attention and praise than others. <i>It is a shame when a mother outshines a daughter.</i> |
| payoff | Payment made to a person in a position of trust to corrupt his judgment. |
| prestigious | Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A prestigious academic post.</i> |
| purchase | Obtain by purchase acquire by means of a financial transaction. <i>The victory was purchased by the death of Rhiwallon.</i> |
