## Attends as a Verb

### Definitions of "Attends" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “attends” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Be present at (meetings, church services, university), etc.*
- *To accompany as a circumstance or follow as a result.*
- *Take charge of or deal with.*
- *Give heed (to).*
- *Work for or be a servant to.*

- advert** Make reference to.
- assist** Give help or assistance be of service.  
*They were **assisting** police with their inquiries.*
- attend to** Take charge of or deal with.
- give ear** Proffer (a body part.
- go to** Move away from a place into another direction.
- hang** Be killed by hanging.  
***Hang** the venison for a few days.*
- look** Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction.  
*It doesn't **look** like you'll be moving to Liverpool.*
- pay heed** Dedicate.
- see** See or watch.  
*Andrew couldn't **see** out of his left eye.*
- serve** Do duty or hold offices serve in a specific function.  
*The cafe refused to **serve** him with the tea.*
- take care** Point or cause to go (blows, weapons, or objects such as photographic equipment) towards.
- wait on** Look forward to the probable occurrence of.



## Usage Examples of "Attends" as a verb

- *Menuhin's playing was attended by a 15-minute standing ovation.*
- *I must attend to this matter.*
- *The children in the audience attended the recital quietly.*
- *I rarely attend services at my church.*
- *She attends the old lady in the wheelchair.*
- *They attended to everything he said.*
- *She attends class regularly.*

- absentee** One that is absent or not in residence.  
*An **absentee** from the match.*
- access** Reach or gain access to.  
*He gained **access** to the building.*
- accessible** Easily obtained.  
*Most students now have computers **accessible**.*
- accompany** Perform an accompaniment to.  
*He would play his violin and Mother used to **accompany** him on our organ.*
- admittance** The right to enter.  
*People were unable to gain **admittance** to the hall.*

<b>advert</b>	An advertisement.
<b><u>assembly</u></b>	A group of machine parts that fit together to form a self-contained unit. <i>The tail <b>assembly</b> of the aircraft.</i>
<b>comprehensive</b>	A comprehensive school. <i>A <b>comprehensive</b> list of sources.</i>
<b><u>convene</u></b>	Meet formally. <i>The committee had <b>convened</b> for its final plenary session.</i> (in the Church of England) a representative assembly of clergy of the province of Canterbury or York.
<b>convocation</b>	<i>The arguments delayed the <b>convocation</b> of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
<b>convoke</b>	Call together or summon (an assembly or meeting). <i>She sent messages <b>convoking</b> a Council of Ministers.</i>
<b>debrief</b>	Put someone through a debriefing and make him report. <i>In the <b>debrief</b> Gary gave his assessment of the trip and his performance.</i>
<b><u>engrave</u></b>	Cut or carve a text or design on (a hard object). <i><b>Engraved</b> the trophy cup with the winner's name.</i>
<b>enroll</b>	Register formally as a participant or member.
<b><u>enrollment</u></b>	The act of enrolling.
<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>The thought never <b>entered</b> my head.</i>
<b>entree</b>	The right to enter. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>entry</b>	The act of beginning something new. <i>Sophisticated features to help ensure accurate data <b>entry</b>.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>In <b>imminent</b> danger.</i>
<b>infix</b>	A formative element inserted in a word. <i>The particles of mercury will <b>infix</b> themselves in the structure of the other metal.</i>
<b>inscribe</b>	Enter the name of (someone) on a list or in a book. <i>He <b>inscribed</b> the first copy To my dearest grandmother.</i>
<b>meeting</b>	An assembly of people for a particular purpose, especially for formal discussion. <i>Next year the <b>meeting</b> will be in Chicago.</i>
<b>participate</b>	Take part in an action or endeavour. <i>Thousands <b>participated</b> in a nationwide strike.</i>

<b>plenary</b>	A meeting or session attended by all participants at a conference or assembly. <i>The House is expected to bring the legislative procedures bill to a <b>plenary</b> meeting.</i>
<b>presence</b>	The immediate proximity of someone or something. <i>He sensed the <b>presence</b> of danger.</i>
<b>present</b>	Something presented as a gift. <i>We cannot <b>represent</b> this knowledge to our formal reason.</i>
<b>reentrant</b>	(of angles) pointing inward.
<b>synod</b>	An assembly of the clergy and sometimes also the laity in a diocese or other division of a particular Church. <i>The deanery <b>synod</b>.</i>
<b>tuck</b>	Make a tuck or several folds in. <i><b>Tuck</b> in the sheet.</i>
<b>wait</b>	Time during which some action is awaited. <i>He did not <b>wait</b> for a reply.</i>
