- *Assiduously attending to the comfort or wishes of others; very polite or courteous.*

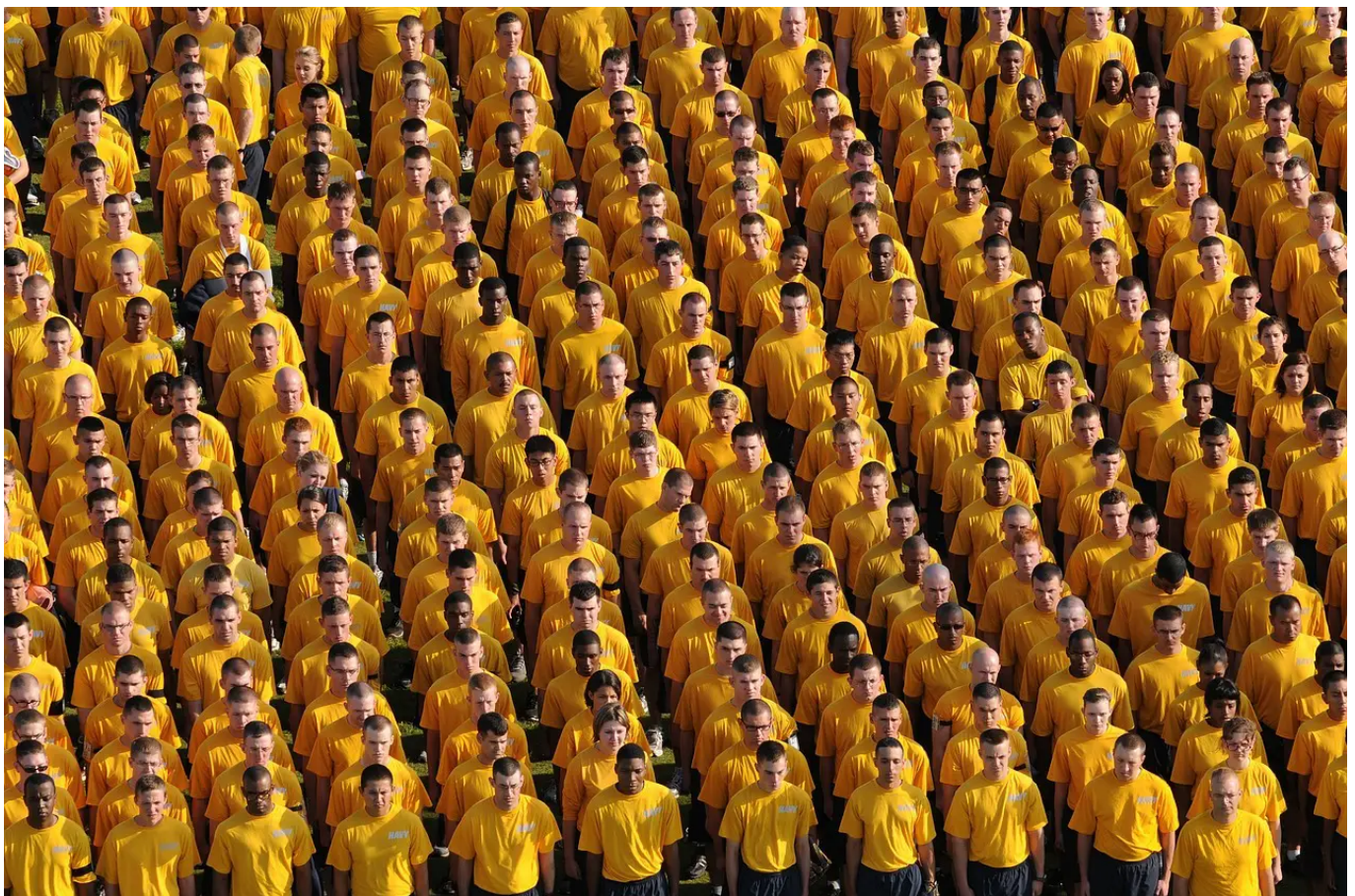


Synonyms of "Attentive" as an adjective (27 Words)

<u>accommodating</u>	Helpful in bringing about a harmonious adaptation. <i>We always found the our local branch most accommodating.</i>
<u>acute</u>	Denoting or designed for patients with an acute form of a disease. <i>An acute awareness of changing fashions.</i>
alert	Mentally perceptive and responsive. <i>Schools need to be constantly alert to this problem.</i>
<u>awake</u>	Not asleep. <i>Still not fully awake.</i>
aware	(sometimes followed by `of') having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Everyone needs to become more environmentally aware.</i>
caring	Feeling and exhibiting concern and empathy for others. <i>Caring friends.</i>

<u>chivalrous</u>	Being attentive to women like an ideal knight. <i>The concept of chivalrous combat.</i>
conscientious	Relating to a person's conscience. <i>Conscientious application to the work at hand.</i>
<u>considerate</u>	Showing careful thought. <i>She was unfailingly kind and considerate.</i>
<u>gallant</u>	Unflinching in battle or action. <i>She had made gallant efforts to pull herself together.</i>
heedful	Giving attention. <i>Heedful of what they were doing.</i>
kind	Having or showing a tender and considerate and helpful nature; used especially of persons and their behavior. <i>Kind to sick patients.</i>
<u>kindly</u>	Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity. <i>Kindly breeze.</i>
<u>mindful</u>	Conscious or aware of something. <i>The judge said that he was not mindful to postpone the eviction again.</i>
obliging	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>One of the most obliging stewards.</i>
observant	Adhering strictly to the rules of a particular religion, especially Judaism. <i>Observant of the speed limit.</i>
paying attention	For which money is paid.
perceptive	Having the ability to perceive or understand; keen in discernment. <i>A perceptive observation.</i>
percipient	Characterized by ease and quickness in perceiving. <i>He is a percipient interpreter of the public mood.</i>
solicitous	Eager or anxious to do something. <i>Solicitous parents.</i>
<u>sympathetic</u>	Of characters in literature or drama evoking empathic or sympathetic feelings. <i>She was sympathetic towards staff with family problems.</i>
<u>tender</u>	Young and immature. <i>Pelargoniums are colourful but tender plants.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Brows drawn together in thoughtful consideration.</i>

understanding	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>An understanding friend.</i>
vigilant	Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. <i>The burglar was spotted by vigilant neighbours.</i>
watchful	Engaged in or accustomed to close observation. <i>Twenty watchful weary tedious nights.</i>
wide awake	Very large in expanse or scope.

alert

A warning serves to make you more alert to danger.
*Security forces are on the **alert** for an upsurge in violence.*

beware

Be on one's guard; be cautious or wary about; be alert to.
*We should **beware** the incompetence of legislators.*

canny

Pleasant; nice.
***Canny** investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.*

careful

Full of cares or anxiety.
*I begged him to be more **careful**.*

carefully

In a way that deliberately avoids harm or errors; cautiously.
*He listened **carefully** to the way people spoke.*

carefulness

The quality of being careful and painstaking.
*I admired the **carefulness** of his work.*

caution	Warn or advise against (doing something). <i>He was cautioned for possessing drugs.</i>
cautious	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>Firms have been unusually cautious about hiring new workers.</i>
cautiously	As if with kid gloves; with caution or prudence or tact. <i>She ventured cautiously downstairs.</i>
chary	Characterized by great caution and wariness. <i>She had been chary of telling the whole truth.</i>
circumspect	Wary and unwilling to take risks. <i>Circumspect actions.</i>
concerned	Culpably involved. <i>Factors concerned in the rise and fall of epidemics.</i>
discreet	Intentionally unobtrusive. <i>We made some discreet inquiries.</i>
discreetly	In an intentionally unobtrusive manner. <i>She coughed discreetly.</i>
discretion	Refined taste; tact. <i>The servants showed great tact and discretion.</i>
forethought	Planning or plotting in advance of acting. <i>Jim had the forethought to book in advance.</i>
heed	Pay close attention to give heed to. <i>We must take heed of the suggestions.</i>
mindful	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>The judge said that he was not mindful to postpone the eviction again.</i>
modesty	Formality and propriety of manner. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i>
observant	Quick to notice or perceive things. <i>An observant Jew.</i>
perfunctory	(of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort. <i>Perfunctory courtesy.</i>
precaution	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took precautions.</i>
prudent	Acting with or showing care and thought for the future. <i>Prudent rulers.</i>
solicitous	Eager or anxious to do something. <i>Solicitous about the future.</i>

thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A deeply thoughtful essay.</i>
vigilant	Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties. <i>The vigilant eye of the town watch.</i>
wary	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>A wary glance at the black clouds.</i>
<u>watch</u>	See or watch. <i>Credit card fraud is on the increase so watch out.</i>
<u>watchdog</u>	A dog kept to guard private property. <i>She is the global watchdog for human rights abuses.</i>
watchful	Engaged in or accustomed to close observation. <i>Twenty watchful weary tedious nights.</i>
