act	Take action do something. <i>The breaks of my new car act quickly.</i>
apathy	The trait of lacking enthusiasm for or interest in things generally. <i>Widespread apathy among students.</i>
bearing	Characteristic way of bearing one s body. <i>The Point is on a bearing of 015.</i>
behaviour	The way in which one acts or conducts oneself, especially towards others. <i>The erratic behaviour of the old car.</i>
bravado	A bold manner or a show of boldness intended to impress or intimidate. <i>He possesses none of the classic wheeler dealer s casual bravado.</i>
comport	Conduct oneself; behave. <i>They do all that nature and art can do to comport with his will.</i>
conduct	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>The concert is to be conducted by Sir Simon Rattle.</i>
demeanor	The way a person behaves toward other people.
disinclination	A reluctance or lack of enthusiasm. <i>Lucy felt a strong disinclination to talk about her engagement.</i>
disinterest	Lack of interest in something. <i>I do not claim any scholarly disinterest with this book.</i>
dispassionate	Not influenced by strong emotion, and so able to be rational and impartial. <i>She dealt with life s disasters in a calm dispassionate way.</i>
equity	The quality of being fair and impartial. <i>Equity of treatment.</i>
ethology	The study of human behaviour and social organization from a biological perspective.
hesitant	Tentative, unsure, or slow in acting or speaking. <i>Clients are hesitant about buying.</i>

hesitatingly	With hesitation; in a hesitant manner.
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
<u>inconsiderate</u>	Lacking regard for the rights or feelings of others. <i>Shockingly inconsiderate behavior.</i>
<u>indecisive</u>	(of a person) not able to make decisions quickly and effectively. <i>He was too indecisive to carry out his political programme.</i>
neutrality	Nonparticipation in a dispute or war. <i>The structure has overall electrical neutrality.</i>
nonchalance	The trait of remaining calm and seeming not to care; a casual lack of concern. <i>An air of nonchalance.</i>
noncommittal	Refusing to bind oneself to a particular course of action or view or the like. <i>Her boyfriend was noncommittal about their future together.</i>
<u>objectivity</u>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any objectivity.</i>
pretension	A claim or assertion of a claim to something. <i>His pretensions to the imperial inheritance.</i>
rationalism	The doctrine that reason is the right basis for regulating conduct. <i>Scientific rationalism.</i>
<u>reluctance</u>	The property of a magnetic circuit of opposing the passage of magnetic flux lines, equal to the ratio of the magnetomotive force to the magnetic flux. <i>She sensed his reluctance to continue.</i>
reluctant	Unwillingness to do something contrary to your custom. <i>Fresh from college and reluctant for the moment to marry him.</i>
reluctantly	With reluctance. <i>He reluctantly agrees to do his duty.</i>
swagger	Walk or behave in a very confident and arrogant or self-important way. <i>I ll take you somewhere swagger.</i>
unconcern	A lack of worry or interest, especially when surprising or callous. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent unconcern about his actions.</i>
<u>unwillingly</u>	Against one's wishes; reluctantly. <i>Anya finds herself thrust unwillingly into the spotlight.</i>
