alibi	Exonerate by means of an alibi. <i>Her friend agreed to alibi her.</i>
apology	A poor example. <i>We were shown into an apology for a bedroom.</i>
bank	A building in which the business of banking transacted. <i>She banked up the fire.</i>
cause	Cause to do cause to act in a specified manner. <i>Forty five causes were entered in the list for the March session.</i>
compensation	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>The grey streets of London were small compensation for the loss of her beloved Africa.</i>
condone	Excuse, overlook, or make allowances for; be lenient with. <i>She condoned her husband s occasional infidelities.</i>
debit	Enter as debit. <i>A double entry system of bookkeeping where each debit has a corresponding credit entry.</i>
default	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>The dealer could repossess the goods if the customer defaulted.</i>
due	A payment that is due e g as the price of membership. <i>The cancellation of the concert was due to the rain.</i>
excuse	Accept an excuse for. <i>I had to excuse myself and go out of the room.</i>
expire	(of a document, authorization, or agreement) come to the end of the period of validity. <i>My passports expired last month.</i>

explicate	Analyse (a literary work) in order to reveal its meaning. <i>An attempt to explicate the relationship between crime and economic forces.</i>
<u>guise</u>	An artful or simulated semblance. <i>Sums paid under the guise of consultancy fees.</i>
<u>justification</u>	The action of declaring or making righteous in the sight of God. <i>The justification of revolutionary action.</i>
<u>justify</u>	Be a good reason for. <i>In most European languages you justify text by adding space between letters and words.</i>
moratorium	A legal authorization to debtors to postpone payment. <i>The debt was to be subject to a five year moratorium.</i>
palliation	To act in such a way as to cause an offense to seem less serious.
pardon	Grant a pardon to. <i>He was pardoned for his treason.</i>
payable	Debts owed by a business; liabilities. <i>It costs just 195 payable in five monthly instalments.</i>
<u>pretense</u>	Pretending with intention to deceive.
pretext	An artful or simulated semblance. <i>The rebels had the perfect pretext for making their move.</i>
prevarication	A statement that deviates from or perverts the truth.
rationalization	The action of making a company, process, or industry more efficient, especially by dispensing with superfluous personnel or equipment. <i>The rationalization of accounting standards.</i>
<u>rationalize</u>	Reorganize (a process or system) so as to make it more logical and consistent. <i>She couldn't rationalize her urge to return to the cottage.</i>
reason	Present reasons and arguments. <i>Humans do not reason entirely from facts.</i>
receivable	Awaiting payment. <i>Accounts receivable.</i>
repayment	The action of paying back a loan. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
taxable	Liable to be taxed; subject to tax. <i>Taxable employee benefits.</i>
