### **Definitions of "Audible" as an adjective**

- *Heard or perceptible by the ear.*
- *Able to be heard.*



## Synonyms of "Audible" as an adjective (7 Words)

**able to be heard** Have the skills and qualifications to do things well.

**appreciable** Enough to be estimated or measured.  
***Appreciable** amounts of noxious wastes are dumped into the harbor.*

**detectable** Able to be perceived or noticed; discernible.  
*The virus is not yet **detectable** in the blood.*

**discernible** Perceptible by the senses or intellect.  
*An essay with a meaning that was not always **discernible**.*

**hearable** Heard or perceptible by the ear.

**perceptible** Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind.  
*He continued after a **perceptible** pause.*

**recognizable** Capable of being recognized.  
*This situation produces **recognizable** stress symptoms.*

## Usage Examples of "Audible" as an adjective

- *Some ultrasound is audible to dogs.*
- *He spoke in an audible whisper.*

## Associations of "Audible" (30 Words)

<b>acoustic</b>	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i><b>Acoustic</b> tiles.</i>
<b>audience</b>	A conference (usually with someone important). <i>The report deserves consideration by a much wider <b>audience</b>.</i>
<b>audio</b>	A recording of acoustic signals. <i>The machine can retrieve and play <b>audio</b> from a CD ROM.</i>
<b>auditory</b>	Of or relating to the process of hearing. <i>Teaching methods use both visual and <b>auditory</b> stimulation.</i>
<b>deaf</b>	Make or render deaf. <i>She returned to Mumbai to run a school for the <b>deaf</b>.</i>
<b>decibel</b>	A unit used to measure the intensity of a sound or the power level of an electrical signal by comparing it with a given level on a logarithmic scale. <i>His voice went up several <b>decibels</b>.</i>
<b>earshot</b>	The range or distance over which one can hear or be heard. <i>The children were told to stay within <b>earshot</b>.</i>
<b>echo</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>These criticisms are <b>echoed</b> in a number of other studies.</i>
<b>gramophone</b>	An antique record player; the sound of the vibrating needle is amplified acoustically.
<b>hear</b>	Examine or hear evidence or a case by judicial process. <i>They <b>heard</b> that I had moved.</i>
<b>hearing</b>	The act of hearing attentively. <i>The investigative committee will hold <b>hearings</b> in Chicago.</i>
<b>intercept</b>	An act or instance of intercepting something. <i>The fighter plane was ordered to <b>intercept</b> an aircraft that had entered the country's airspace.</i>
<b>listen</b>	An act of listening to something. <i>If I've had a stressful day I love to chill out and <b>listen</b> to music.</i>
<b>listening</b>	The act of hearing attentively. <i>You can learn a lot by just <b>listening</b>.</i>

<b>musical</b>	Containing or constituting or characterized by pleasing melody. <i>Comes from a very <b>musical</b> family.</i>
<b>mute</b>	Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute. <i><b>Mute</b> e is generally dropped before suffixes beginning with a vowel.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Make a lot of noise. <i>The announcement of the election recount caused a lot of <b>noise</b>.</i>
<b>phonetic</b>	Relating to phonetics. <i><b>Phonetic</b> training.</i>
<b>phonetics</b>	The branch of acoustics concerned with speech processes including its production and perception and acoustic analysis. <i>A <b>phonetics</b> laboratory.</i>
<b>phonic</b>	Pertaining to the phonic method of teaching reading. <i>The devices of poetry foreground <b>phonic</b> elements that are usually ignored in practical speech.</i>
<b>phonology</b>	The system of contrastive relationships among the speech sounds that constitute the fundamental components of a language.
<b>recorder</b>	An apparatus for recording sound, pictures, or data. <i>A cockpit voice <b>recorder</b>.</i>
<b>resound</b>	Sing (the praises) of. <i>The office <b>resounds</b> with the metronomic clicking of keyboards.</i>
<b>reverberate</b>	Spring back; spring away from an impact. <i>Her deep booming laugh <b>reverberated</b> around the room.</i>
<b>reverberation</b>	The repetition of a sound resulting from reflection of the sound waves. <i>The attack has had <b>reverberations</b> around the world.</i>
<b>ring</b>	A ring shaped or circular object. <i>A <b>ring</b> of ships in the harbor.</i>
<b>sonic</b>	Having or caused by speed approximately equal to that of sound in air at sea level. <i>The whales emit <b>sonic</b> pulse systems.</i>
<b>speaking</b>	Capable of or involving speech or speaking. <i>An English <b>speaking</b> guide.</i>
<b>squeaking</b>	Having or making a high-pitched sound such as that made by a mouse or a rusty hinge.
<b>voice</b>	Give voice to. <i>The noisy <b>voice</b> of the waterfall.</i>
