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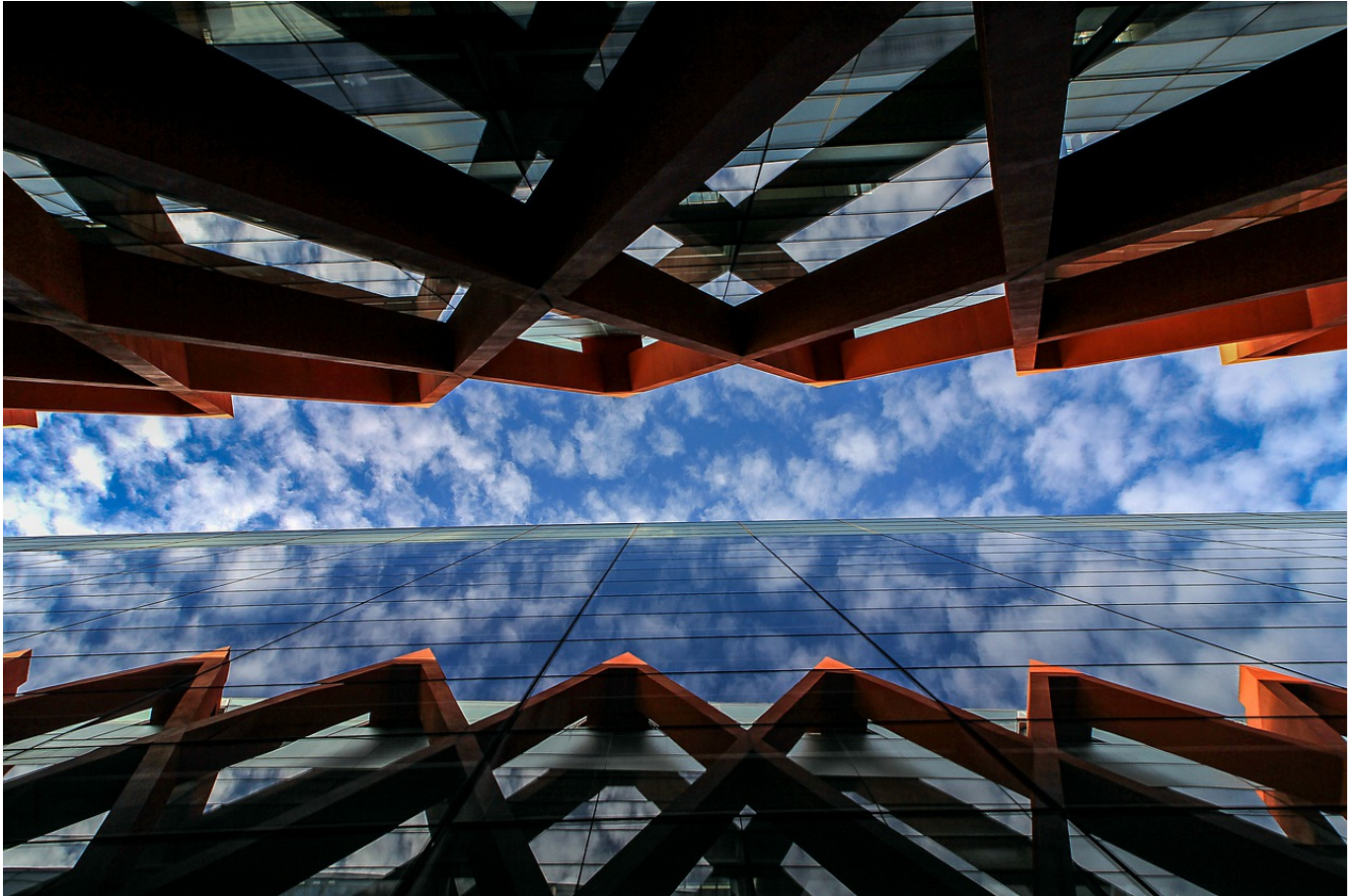

<b>probe</b>	An unmanned exploratory spacecraft designed to transmit information about its environment. <i>A <b>probe</b> into city hall corruption.</i>
<b>review</b>	A subsequent examination of a patient for the purpose of monitoring earlier treatment. <i>She released her debut solo album to rave <b>reviews</b>.</i>
<b>scrutiny</b>	The act of examining something closely (as for mistakes). <i>Every aspect of local government was placed under <b>scrutiny</b>.</i>
<b>study</b>	A thing that is or deserves to be investigated the subject of an individual's study. <i>Anthropology is the <b>study</b> of human beings.</i>
<u><a href="#">survey</a></u>	An act of surveying an area of land. <i>The flight involved a detailed aerial <b>survey</b> of military bases.</i>
<u><a href="#">vetting</a></u>	The process of investigating someone thoroughly, especially in order to ensure that they are suitable for a job requiring secrecy, loyalty, or trustworthiness. <i>The <b>vetting</b> of people who work with children.</i>
