<u>abstemious</u>	Marked by temperance in indulgence. Abstemious with the use of adverbs.
abstinent	Self-restraining; not indulging an appetite especially for food or drink. The patients are best advised to be totally abstinent from alcohol.
aloof	Conspicuously uninvolved. An aloof and somewhat austere figure.
ascetic	Pertaining to or characteristic of an ascetic or the practice of rigorous self discipline. Be systematically ascetic do something for no other reason than that you would rather not do it.
ascetical	Practicing great self-denial- William James.
<u>basic</u>	(of rock, especially lava) relatively poor in silica. <i>The food was good if a bit</i> basic .



celibate	Abstaining from sexual intercourse. A celibate lifestyle.
<u>chaste</u>	Morally pure (especially not having experienced sexual intercourse. What is required of celibate Catholic clergy is to remain chaste .
chilly	Uncomfortably or unpleasantly cold. He got a chilly reception from Republican activists.
cold	Of a person feeling uncomfortably cold. <i>Cold</i> fury gripped him.
continent	Having control over urination and defecation.
<u>distant</u>	(after a measurement) at a specified distance. A distant likeness.
dour	Showing a brooding ill humor- Bruce Bli. The proverbially dour New England Puritan.
flinty	(of a person or their expression) very hard and unyielding. <i>Flinty soil.</i>
forbidding	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. A forbidding scowl.
formal	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e g of formal dress. I don t know enough about art to appreciate the purely formal qualities.
<u>frigid</u>	Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. My ex told everyone I was frigid .
frosty	Covered with frost. Got a frosty reception.
frugal	Sparing or economical as regards money or food. A frugal meal.
functional	Designed for or adapted to a function or use. <i>Functional deafness.</i>
<u>grave</u>	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. Faced a grave decision in a time of crisis.
<u>grim</u>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. A grim joke.
hair-shirt	Self-sacrificing or austere.
harsh	Of textures that are rough to the touch or substances consisting of relatively large particles. <i>Had harsh words.</i>



icy	Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. <i>Icy hands</i> .
moderate	Not extreme. <i>Moderate</i> success.
<u>modest</u>	Humble in spirit or manner; suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. The modest women wear long sleeved dresses and all but cover their faces.
muted	In a softened tone. The muted hum of the distant traffic.
plain	Easy to perceive or understand; clear. A plain honest man with no nonsense about him.
puritanical	Having or displaying a very strict or censorious moral attitude towards self-indulgence or sex. <i>His puritanical parents saw any kind of pleasure as the road to</i> <i>damnation.</i>
<u>remote</u>	(of a chance or possibility) unlikely to occur. <i>The remote past or future.</i>
<u>reserved</u>	Marked by self-restraint and reticence. A reserved seat.
restrained	(of colour, decoration, etc.) not excessively showy or ornate; understated. <i>The drawings with their</i> restrained <i>colours give a feeling of peace and contemplation.</i>
self-abnegating	Used especially of behavior.
self-denying	Used especially of behavior.
self-disciplined	Used of nonindulgent persons.
self-sacrificing	Willing to deprive yourself.
serious	Solemn or thoughtful in character or manner. A serious wound.
<u>severe</u>	Severely simple. A severe attack of asthma.
simple	(botany) of leaf shapes; of leaves having no divisions or subdivisions. A simple substance.
<u>sober</u>	Dignified and somber in manner or character and committed to keeping promises. As sober as a judge.



Characterized by a firm and humorless belief in the validity of your opinions. <i>He swore a solemn oath to keep faith.</i>
Of or relating to or characteristic of Sparta or its people. <i>The accommodation was fairly spartan</i> .
Providing no shelter or sustenance. The stark reality of life for millions of young people.
Resembling steel as in hardness. <i>Steely</i> eyes.
Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. A stern disciplinarian.
(of a person or their manner) not relaxed or friendly; constrained. A palace guardsman stiff as a poker.
Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>Rough stony paths.</i>
Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>Civil servants are bound by</i> strict <i>rules on secrecy.</i>
(of a person) not receptive to new or unusual ideas; conventional and narrow-minded. Hot and stuffy and the air was blue with smoke.
Not brilliant or glaring. A subdued whisper.
Free from extremes; mild; or characteristic of such weather or climate. <i>The temperate zones.</i>
Not decorated with something to increase its beauty or distinction. The unadorned truth.
Lacking love and generosity. All pious words and uncharitable deeds.
Having nothing extraneous. An uncluttered room.
Not adorned or decorated. The walls were completely undecorated .
Not embellished or decorated. The unembellished truth.
Cool and formal in manner. A flat unemotional voice.



unfeeling	Devoid of feeling for others. An unfeeling wretch.
<u>unforgiving</u>	Not willing to forgive or excuse people's faults or wrongdoings. A surly unforgiving old woman.
<u>unfriendly</u>	Not easy to understand or use. An unfriendly action to take.
unfurnished	Not supplied. An unfurnished apartment.
unfussy	Not fussy. A simple unfussy design.
unornamented	Not having any decoration. Functional architecture featuring stark unornamented concrete.
unostentatious	Not ostentatious. Unostentatious elegance.
unsmiling	(of a person or their manner or expression) serious or unfriendly; not smiling. <i>His face was hard and unsmiling.</i>
unsympathetic	Not sympathetic or disposed toward. People unsympathetic to the revolution.






Usage Examples of "Austere" as an adjective

exacting	Requiring precise accuracy. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely</i> exacting <i>in their requirements.</i>
extreme	The highest or most extreme degree of something. The extreme of applying for poor relief.
formalism	The use of forms of worship without regard to inner significance. There is a formalism which expresses the idea of superposition.
harsh	Sharply disagreeable; rigorous. The harsh realities of the world news.
inflexible	Not able to be changed or adapted to particular circumstances. <i>Heavy</i> inflexible armour.
martinet	Someone who demands exact conformity to rules and forms. A martinet of a staff officer.
moralist	A philosopher who specializes in morals and moral problems.
painstakingly	In a fastidious and painstaking manner. The property has been painstakingly restored by its current owners.
pedant	A person who pays more attention to formal rules and book learning than they merit. <i>The royal palace some</i> pedant <i>s would say the ex royal palace.</i>
rigor	The quality of being valid and rigorous. The rigor s of boot camp.
<u>rigorous</u>	(of a rule, system, etc.) strictly applied or adhered to. <i>Rigorous</i> application of the law.
rigour	Severity or strictness. His analysis is lacking in rigour .
<u>severe</u>	Severely simple. The house suffered severe damage.
severity	Excessive sternness. Hay fever symptoms vary in severity .



spartan	Of or relating to or characteristic of Sparta or its people. The accommodation was fairly spartan .
stern	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. A stern face.
stoutly	With courage and determination. <i>He stoutly maintained his innocence.</i>
strict	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. My father was very strict .
stringency	A state occasioned by scarcity of money and a shortage of credit.
<u>stringent</u>	Demanding strict attention to rules and procedures. <i>Stringent</i> safety measures.
stringently	In a stringent manner. The laws are stringently enforced.
<u>unkind</u>	Inconsiderate and harsh to others. You were terribly unkind to her.
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not giving way to kindness or compassion. The heat was unrelenting .
