- *A feature of an austere way of life.*

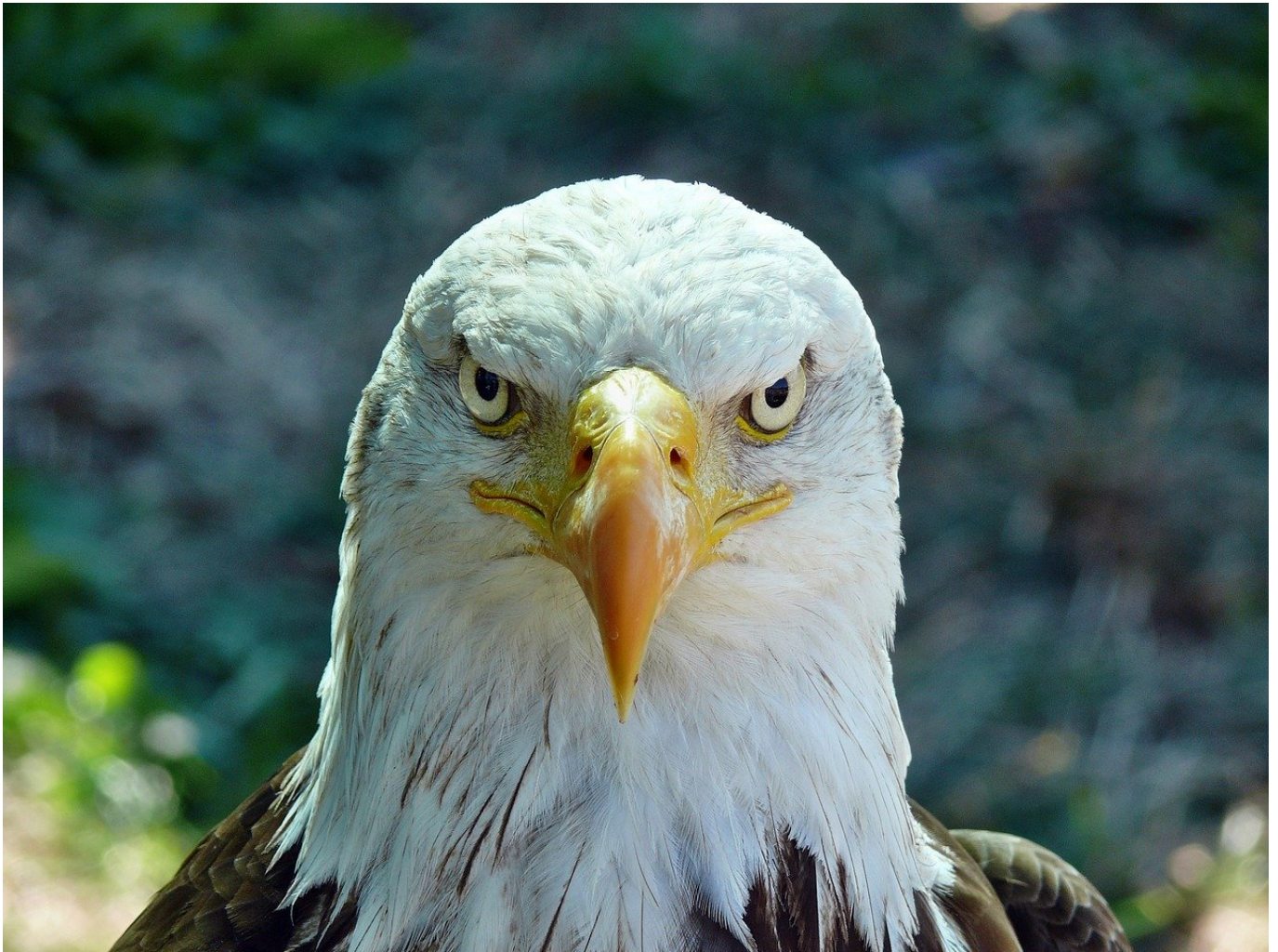

<b>frugality</b>	The quality of being economical with money or food; thriftiness. <i>He scorned the finer things in life and valued <b>frugality</b> and simplicity.</i>
<b>graveness</b>	Rock fragments and pebbles.
<b>gravity</b>	The degree of intensity of gravity measured by acceleration. <i>The more remote the body the less the <b>gravity</b>.</i>
<b>grimness</b>	Something hard to endure.
<b>lack of adornment</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of decoration</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of embellishment</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of ornament</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>lack of ornamentation</b>	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
<b>moderation</b>	Quality of being moderate and avoiding extremes. <i>He urged the police to show <b>moderation</b>.</i>
<b>nonindulgence</b>	The trait of great self-denial (especially refraining from worldly pleasures).
<b>plainness</b>	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous. <i>The <b>plainness</b> of vanilla ice cream.</i>
<b>restraint</b>	The action of keeping someone or something under control. <i>The room was simply decorated with great <b>restraint</b>.</i>
<b>rigour</b>	Excessive sternness. <i>The <b>rigours</b> of a harsh winter.</i>
<b>seriousness</b>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>She replied with deadly <b>seriousness</b>.</i>
<b>severity</b>	Excessive sternness. <i><b>Severity</b> of character.</i>
<b>soberness</b>	The state of not being under the influence of alcohol; sobriety. <i>There isn't a lot of energy here due to the <b>soberness</b> of the music.</i>
<b>sombreness</b>	A manner that is serious and solemn.

<b>sternness</b>	Uncompromising resolution. <i>The <b>sternness</b> of his surroundings made him uncomfortable.</i>
<b>stiffness</b>	The quality of being firm and difficult to bend or move. <i>The <b>stiffness</b> of a boot affects the mobility of the foot.</i>
<b>strictness</b>	Conscientious attention to rules and details. <i>The <b>strictness</b> of his upbringing.</i>
<b>unpretentiousness</b>	The quality of being natural and without pretensions.

<b>depositor</b>	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
<b>economical</b>	(of a person or lifestyle) careful not to waste money or resources. <i>A small <b>economical</b> car.</i>
<b>economy</b>	A particular system or stage of an economy. <i>Fuel <b>economy</b>.</i>
<b>financially</b>	From a financial point of view. <i>The company is now <b>financially</b> stable.</i>
<b>frugal</b>	Sparing or economical as regards money or food. <i>A <b>frugal</b> meal.</i>

<b>frugality</b>	Prudence in avoiding waste. <i>He scorned the finer things in life and valued <b>frugality</b> and simplicity.</i>
<b>industrialize</b>	(of a country or region) build up a system of industries. <i>The country needs to <b>industrialize</b> to create both exports and jobs.</i>
<b>market</b>	A marketplace where groceries are sold. <i>Before they publish any book they try to determine the size of the <b>market</b> for it.</i>
<b>meanness</b>	Lack of quality or attractiveness; shabbiness. <i>The <b>meanness</b> of that existence.</i>
<b>microeconomics</b>	The branch of economics that studies the economy of consumers or households or individual firms.
<b>miser</b>	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical <b>miser</b> he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
<b>parsimonious</b>	Very unwilling to spend money or use resources. <i><b>Parsimonious</b> thrift relieved by few generous impulses.</i>
<b>parsimony</b>	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government <b>parsimony</b>.</i>
<b>petty</b>	Contemptibly narrow in outlook. <i><b>Petty</b> little comments.</i>
<b>recession</b>	The action of receding; motion away from an observer. <i>The country is in the depths of a <b>recession</b>.</i>
<b>save</b>	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>This will <b>save</b> you a lot of time.</i>
<b>saving</b>	Recovery or preservation from loss or danger. <i>Innovative money <b>saving</b> ideas for students.</i>
<b>savings</b>	A fund of money put by as a reserve.
<b>schlock</b>	Cheap or inferior goods or material; trash. <i>Mass produced <b>schlock</b>.</i>
<b>sparing</b>	Moderate; economical. <i>A <b>sparing</b> father and a spending son.</i>
<b>sparingly</b>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used <b>sparingly</b>.</i>
<b>stagflation</b>	A period of slow economic growth and high unemployment (stagnation) while prices rise (inflation).
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.

- stingy** Deficient in amount or quality or extent.  
*His boss is **stingy** and idle.*
- thrift** Any of numerous sun-loving low-growing evergreens of the genus Armeria having round heads of pink or white flowers.  
*The values of **thrift** and self reliance.*
- thriftiness** Frugality in the expenditure of money or resources.
- thrifty** Using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully.  
*He had been brought up to be **thrifty** and careful.*
- tightwad** A mean or miserly person.  
*He is a notorious **tightwad**.*
- unemployment** The state of being unemployed or not having a job.  
*The rate of **unemployment** is an indicator of the health of an economy.*
