- *Resembling the unthinking functioning of a machine.*
- *(especially of a legal sanction) given or imposed as a necessary and inevitable result of a fixed rule or particular set of circumstances.*
- *(of a firearm) self-loading and able to fire continuously until the ammunition is exhausted or the pressure on the trigger is released.*
- *(of a motor vehicle or its transmission) using gears that change by themselves*



*according to speed and acceleration.*

- *Done or occurring as a matter of course and without debate.*
- *Operating with minimal human intervention; independent of external control.*
- *Without volition or conscious control.*
- *Done or occurring spontaneously, without conscious thought or attention.*
- *(of a device or process) working by itself with little or no direct human control.*

<b>instinctual</b>	Relating to or denoting an innate, typically fixed pattern of behaviour; based on instinct. <i><b>Instinctual</b> maternal behaviour.</i>
<u><b>involuntary</b></u>	(especially of muscles or nerves) concerned in bodily processes that are not under the control of the will. <i>She gave an <b>involuntary</b> shudder.</i>
<b>machinelike</b>	Resembling the unthinking functioning of a machine. <i><b>Machinelike</b> efficiency.</i>
<u><b>mechanical</b></u>	Relating to mechanics as a science. <i><b>Mechanical</b> design.</i>
<b>mechanized</b>	Made mechanical in character. <i><b>Mechanized</b> factories emerged in the mid nineteenth century.</i>
<b>necessary</b>	Absolutely essential. <i>The <b>necessary</b> consequences of one's actions.</i>
<b>preprogrammed</b>	(of an electronic device) having been programmed in advance. <i>The app includes several <b>preprogrammed</b> colour settings.</i>
<b>reflex</b>	(of a thought) directed or turned back upon the mind itself; introspective. <i>A <b>reflex</b> knee jerk.</i>
<b>reflexive</b>	Of a verb or clause having a reflexive pronoun as its object e.g. wash oneself. <i>Sneezing is <b>reflexive</b>.</i>
<u><b>robotic</b></u>	Relating to or of the nature of robots. <i>His <b>robotic</b> voice.</i>

<b>robotlike</b>	Resembling or suggestive of a robot.
<b>routine</b>	Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>The Ministry insisted that this was just a <b>routine</b> annual drill.</i>
<b><u>subconscious</u></b>	Of or concerning the part of the mind of which one is not fully aware but which influences one's actions and feelings. <i>My <b>subconscious</b> fear.</i>
<b><u>unavoidable</u></b>	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>An <b>unavoidable</b> accident.</i>
<b>unconditioned</b>	Not established by conditioning or learning. <i>Waste in its raw <b>unconditioned</b> form.</i>
<b><u>unconscious</u></b>	Unaware of. <i>He would wipe back his hair in an <b>unconscious</b> gesture of annoyance.</i>
<b><u>unemotional</u></b>	Not having or showing strong feelings. <i>A flat <b>unemotional</b> voice.</i>
<b>unmanned</b>	Not having or needing a crew or staff. <i>An <b>unmanned</b> level crossing.</i>
<b>unpreventable</b>	Not able to be prevented or avoided. <i>Until now this devastating disease has been <b>unpreventable</b>.</i>
<b>unthinking</b>	Without care or thought for others. <i>She was at pains to correct <b>unthinking</b> prejudices.</i>

<b>electrical</b>	Of a company or shop manufacturing or selling electrical appliances. <i>An <b>electrical</b> storm.</i>
<b>electronically</b>	By means of electronic equipment or devices. <i>Molecules that can accept energy to form <b>electronically</b> excited states.</i>
<u><b>engineering</b></u>	The practical application of science to commerce or industry. <i>If not for his shrewd <b>engineering</b> the election would have been lost.</i>
<b>equipment</b>	The process of supplying someone or something with necessary equipment. <i>The construction and <b>equipment</b> of new harbour facilities.</i>
<b>industrial</b>	Relating to or denoting a type of harsh uncompromising rock music incorporating sounds resembling those produced by industrial machinery. <i>The <b>industrial</b> classes.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	Unthinking; prompted by (or as if by) instinct. <i>An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.</i>
<u><b>involuntary</b></u>	Not subject to the control of the will- John F.Kennedy. <i><b>Involuntary</b> servitude.</i>
<b>kinematics</b>	The branch of mechanics concerned with motion without reference to force or mass.
<b>machine</b>	A person who acts with the mechanical efficiency of a machine. <i>A cigarette <b>machine</b>.</i>
<b>machinery</b>	Machines or machine systems collectively. <i>The <b>machinery</b> of command labored and brought forth an order.</i>
<u><b>mechanical</b></u>	Relating to or governed by or in accordance with mechanics. <i>The smoothness was the result of <b>mechanical</b> abrasion.</i>
<u><b>mechanism</b></u>	A contrivance in the plot of a literary work. <i>His Irma La Douce is a musical based on the farce <b>mechanism</b>.</i>

<b>mechanization</b>	The action or process of making something mechanical in character. <i>The <b>mechanization</b> of war made possible killing on a scale never foreseen.</i>
<b>mechanize</b>	Make mechanical in character. <i><b>Mechanize</b> the procedure.</i>
<u><b>naturally</b></u>	Through inherent nature. <i>A <b>naturally</b> bright pupil.</i>
<b>reflex</b>	In reflexology a response in a part of the body to stimulation of a corresponding point on the feet hands or head. <i>Sneezing is a <b>reflex</b> action.</i>
<u><b>robot</b></u>	A person who behaves in a mechanical or unemotional manner. <i>A <b>robot</b> arm.</i>
<u><b>robotic</b></u>	Of or relating to mechanical robots. <i>A <b>robotic</b> device for performing surgery.</i>
