Autumn as a Noun

Definitions of "Autumn" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “autumn” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The period from the autumn equinox to the winter solstice.*
- *The season after summer and before winter, in the northern hemisphere from September to November and in the southern hemisphere from March to May.*
- *The season when the leaves fall from the trees.*



Synonyms of "Autumn" as a noun (5 Words)

- decline** A condition inferior to an earlier condition; a gradual falling off from a better state.
*He died at his brother's of a deep **decline**.*
- downturn** A worsening of business or economic activity.
*A **downturn** in the housing market.*
- ebb** The movement of the tide out to sea.
*The tide was on the **ebb**.*
- fall** A waterfall or cascade.
*There is a **fall** of woodcock in the round wood above the dell.*
- waning** A gradual decrease in magnitude or extent.
*The waxing and **waning** of the moon.*

- *The countryside is ablaze with colour in autumn.*
- *Autumn leaves.*
- *Europe can expect warmer summers and wetter autumns.*
- *He was in the autumn of his life.*

- blizzard** A large or overwhelming number of things arriving suddenly.

- boreal** Relating to or denoting the second climatic stage of the postglacial period in northern Europe between the Preboreal and Atlantic stages about 9 000 to 7 500 years ago marked by a warm dry climate.
*Northern **boreal** forest.*
- chill** Chilly.
*She always seems to be just **chilling** with friends.*
- chilly** Appreciably or disagreeably cold.
*A **chilly** February evening.*
- climate** A region with a particular climate.
*Our cold wet **climate**.*

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| fall | The season when the leaves fall from the trees. <i>The barometer is falling.</i> |
| freezing | The freezing point of water 0 C. <i>The temperature was well above freezing.</i> |
| frigid | Very cold in temperature. <i>My ex told everyone I was frigid.</i> |
| frozen | Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. <i>Frozen prices.</i> |
| fruit | Cause to bear fruit. <i>The trees fruited early this year.</i> |
| harvest | Gather a crop as a harvest. <i>Should one harvest organs from dead people for transplants.</i> |
| iceberg | Lettuce with crisp tightly packed light-green leaves in a firm head. <i>Iceberg is still the most popular lettuce.</i> |
| icicle | A hanging, tapering piece of ice formed by the freezing of dripping water. |
| mature | Fully developed or matured and ready to be eaten or used. <i>She was now a mature woman.</i> |
| midwinter | The winter solstice. <i>In midwinter the track became a muddy morass.</i> |
| opportune | (of a time) especially convenient or appropriate for a particular action or event. <i>An opportune place to make camp.</i> |
| ripe | Full of. <i>Ripe peaches.</i> |
| season | A period when a female mammal is ready to mate. <i>The rainy season.</i> |
| seasonable | Usual for or appropriate to a particular season of the year. <i>The seasonable temperatures.</i> |
| sherbet | Beer. <i>I went down the local pub for a few sherbets.</i> |
| snowfall | The quantity of snow falling within a given area in a given time. <i>Heavy snowfalls made travel absolutely impossible.</i> |
| snowflake | A white-flowered Eurasian plant related to and resembling the snowdrop, typically blooming in the summer or autumn. <i>These little snowflakes will soon discover that life doesn't come with trigger warnings.</i> |

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| snowy | (of weather or a period of time) characterized by snowfall. <i>A snowy January day.</i> |
| <u>spill</u> | Liquid that is spilled. <i>The former employee spilled all the details.</i> |
| spring | Move rapidly or suddenly from a constrained position by or as if by the action of a spring. <i>In spring the garden is a feast of blossom.</i> |
| summer | Spend the summer in a particular place. <i>A girl of sixteen or seventeen summers.</i> |
| tropical | Very hot and humid. <i>Tropical weather.</i> |
| <u>winter</u> | The period from the winter solstice to the vernal equinox. <i>We wintered on the Riviera.</i> |
