apophasis	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
<u>avert</u>	Prevent or ward off (an undesirable occurrence. <i>Avert</i> a strike.
banish	Expel from a community or group. Banish bad thoughts.
<u>bypass</u>	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. A manager might bypass formal channels of communication.
circumvent	Avoid or try to avoid fulfilling, answering, or performing (duties, questions, or issues. <i>He s circumvented her with some of his stories.</i>
circumvention	The action of overcoming a problem or difficulty, typically in a clever and surreptitious way. <i>Circumvention</i> of the rules undermines any fairness.



<u>deflect</u>	Turn aside and away from an initial or intended course. The ball deflect ed off Knight s body.
derail	(of a train or tram) accidentally leave the tracks. The plot is seen by some as an attempt to derail the negotiations.
<u>deter</u>	Turn away from by persuasion. <i>Strategists think not only about how to deter war but about how war might occur.</i>
<u>detour</u>	Avoid by taking a detour. He had made a detour to a cafe.
<u>dodge</u>	A statement that evades the question by cleverness or trickery. Marchers had to dodge missiles thrown by loyalists.
elude	Be incomprehensible to; escape understanding by. He tried to elude the security men by sneaking through a back door.
escape	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>Hard work was his escape from worry.</i>
eschew	Avoid and stay away from deliberately; stay clear of. <i>He appealed to the crowd to eschew violence.</i>
<u>evade</u>	(of an abstract thing) elude (someone. This man always hesitates and evade s.
evasion	An indirect answer; a prevaricating excuse. Their adroit evasion of almost all questions.
firewall	Protect a network or system from unauthorized access with a firewall. <i>Our security products offer integral firewalling.</i>
foreclose	Rule out or prevent (a course of action. The bank was threatening to foreclose on his mortgage.
forestall	Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time. They will present their resignations to forestall a vote of no confidence.
forfend	Avert or prevent (something evil or unpleasant. The fiend forfend said the grim Earl.
hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>The hinder part of a carcass.</i>
illegalize	Declare illegal; outlaw.
obviate	Do away with. The presence of roller blinds obviate d the need for curtains.



<u>ostracize</u>	(in ancient Greece) banish (an unpopular or overly powerful citizen) from a city for five or ten years by popular vote. <i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues ostracize me.</i>
parry	An act of parrying something. <i>Her question met with a polite parry.</i>
<u>preclude</u>	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. The secret nature of his work preclude d official recognition.
<u>shun</u>	Persistently avoid, ignore, or reject (someone or something) through antipathy or caution. <i>He shunned fashionable society.</i>
sidestep	Avoid (someone or something) by stepping sideways. We learned how to sidestep up the slope and slide cautiously down.
<u>thwart</u>	Prevent (someone) from accomplishing something. He was thwart ed in his desire to punish Uncle Fred.
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. Some patients have diseases that go undiagnosed and therefore
