<b>grant</b>	A right or privilege that has been granted. <i>A <b>grant</b> of probate.</i>
<b>granting</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business.
<b>honor</b>	The state of being honored. <i>A man of <b>honor</b>.</i>
<b>honour</b>	A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction. <i>She passed with <b>honours</b>.</i>
<b>laurels</b>	A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction.
<b>medal</b>	A metal disc typically of the size of a large coin and bearing an inscription or design, made to commemorate an event or awarded as a distinction to someone such as a soldier or athlete.
<b>payment</b>	An act of requiting; returning in kind. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<b>presentation</b>	A visual representation of something. <i>A breech <b>presentation</b>.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Something given as a token of victory. <i>Britain s most prestigious <b>prize</b> for contemporary art.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">scholarship</a></u></b>	A grant or payment made to support a student's education, awarded on the basis of academic or other achievement. <i>Tim held a Humboldt <b>scholarship</b>.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The process of establishing a settlement or settlements. <i>They finally reached a <b>settlement</b> with the union.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">trophy</a></u></b>	A souvenir of an achievement, especially a part of an animal taken when hunting.

- *Grant or assign (a contract or commission) to (a person or organization).*
- *Give as judged due or on the basis of merit.*

<b>credentials</b>	A document attesting to the truth of certain stated facts.
<b>creditable</b>	Worthy of often limited commendation. <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was <b>creditable</b>.</i>

<b>prize</b>	Denoting something for which a prize is awarded. <i>We <b>prize</b> his creativity.</i>
<b>raffle</b>	Offer as a prize in a raffle. <i>A <b>raffle</b> ticket.</i>
<u><b>reputable</b></u>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> business.</i>
<u><b>scholarship</b></u>	Academic study or achievement; learning at a high level. <i>He went on a state sponsored <b>scholarship</b> to study engineering.</i>
<u><b>trophy</b></u>	An award for success in war or hunting.
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A <b>worthy</b> cause.</i>
