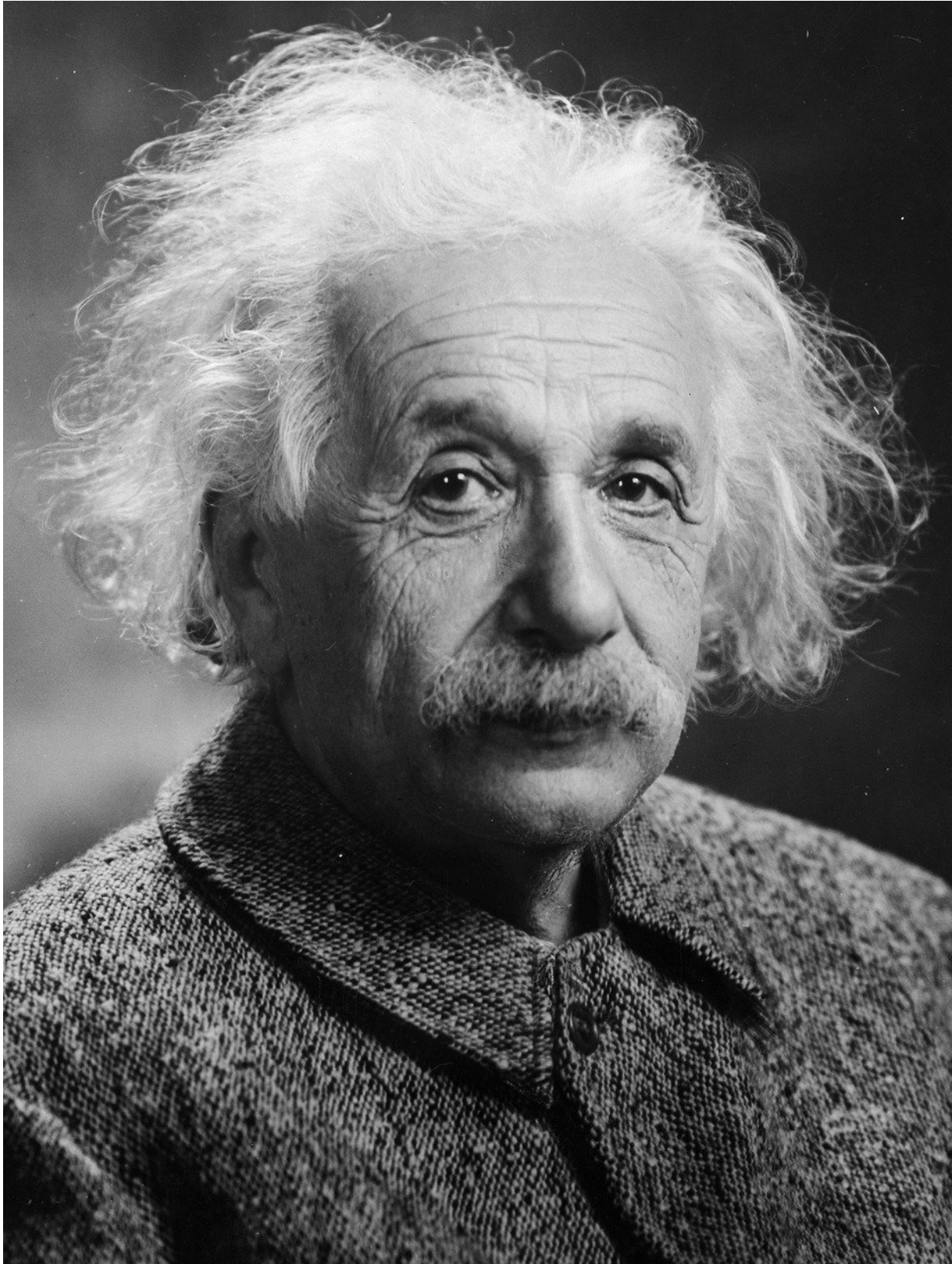

- accolade** A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction.  
*The hotel has won numerous **accolades**.*
- accomplishment** The action of accomplishing something.  
*A poet of considerable **accomplishment**.*
- achievement** A thing done successfully with effort, skill, or courage.  
*To reach this stage is a great **achievement**.*
- acquisition** The learning or developing of a skill, habit, or quality.  
*The child's **acquisition** of language.*
- attainment** The action or fact of achieving a goal towards which one has worked.  
*The **attainment** of corporate aims.*
- bestow** Bestow a quality on.  
*The office was **bestowed** on him by the monarch of this realm.*
- bestowal** The act of conferring an honor or presenting a gift.

<b>certification</b>	The action or process of providing someone or something with an official document attesting to a status or level of achievement. <i>The <b>certification</b> of teachers.</i>
<b>credentials</b>	A document attesting to the truth of certain stated facts.
<b>creditable</b>	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>A very <b>creditable</b> 2 4 defeat.</i>
<u><a href="#">deserve</a></u>	Be worthy or deserving. <i>You <b>deserve</b> a promotion after all the hard work you have done.</i>
<b>emeritus</b>	Honorably retired from assigned duties and retaining your title along with the additional title emeritus as in professor emeritus. <i><b>Emeritus</b> professor of microbiology.</i>
<u><a href="#">fame</a></u>	Favorable public reputation. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her <b>fame</b> and fortune.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i>A research <b>grant</b>.</i>
<b>honor</b>	The state of being honored. <i><b>Honor</b> your parents.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
<b>honour</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>You are an <b>honour</b> to our profession.</i>
<b>induct</b>	Formally introduce (a member of the clergy) into possession of a benefice. <i>Arrangements for <b>inducting</b> new members to an organization.</i>
<u><a href="#">influential</a></u>	An influential person. <i><b>Influential</b> leadership for peace.</i>
<b>laureate</b>	Someone honored for great achievements; figuratively someone crowned with a laurel wreath. <i>A Nobel <b>laureate</b>.</i>
<b>medal</b>	Win a medal in a sporting event. <i>They <b>medalled</b> in all the relay events.</i>
<b>medallion</b>	An oval or circular painting, panel, or design used to decorate a building or textile. <i><b>Medallions</b> of veal.</i>
<b>nobel</b>	Swedish chemist remembered for his invention of dynamite and for the bequest that created the Nobel prizes (1833-1896).

<b>prestigious</b>	Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> author.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Denoting something for which a prize is awarded. <i>A <b>prize</b> crossword.</i>
<b>raffle</b>	Offer as a prize in a raffle. <i>A <b>raffle</b> ticket.</i>
<b>reputable</b>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> scientist.</i>
<b>scholarship</b>	A grant or payment made to support a student's education, awarded on the basis of academic or other achievement. <i>The intellectual dishonesty has nothing to do with lack of <b>scholarship</b>.</i>
<b>trophy</b>	(in ancient Greece or Rome) the weapons of a defeated army set up as a memorial of victory.
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>Generous donations to <b>worthy</b> causes.</i>
