<b>fear</b>	A feeling of anxiety concerning the outcome of something or the safety of someone. <i>They hushed it up out of <b>fear</b> of public reaction.</i>
<b><u>glamour</u></b>	Beauty or charm that is sexually attractive. <i>A <b>glamour</b> model.</i>
<b>magic</b>	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>He s been working his <b>magic</b> on New Zealand movies for the past two decades.</i>
<b><u>mystery</u></b>	The Christian Eucharist. <i>A <b>mystery</b> guest.</i>
<b>reverence</b>	A feeling of profound respect for someone or something. <i>Rituals showed honour and <b>reverence</b> for the dead.</i>
<b><u>romance</u></b>	A feeling of excitement and mystery associated with love. <i>The <b>romance</b> from <i>The Gadfly</i> became a popular favourite.</i>
<b><u>spell</u></b>	A verbal formula believed to have magical force. <i>A <b>spell</b> of good weather.</i>
<b>veneration</b>	Great respect; reverence. <i>The traditional <b>veneration</b> of saints.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>He observed the intricacy of the ironwork with the <b>wonder</b> of a child.</i>
<b>wonderment</b>	The feeling aroused by something strange and surprising. <i>Corbett shook his head in silent <b>wonderment</b>.</i>

<b>astound</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b><u>bewilderment</u></b>	A feeling of being perplexed and confused. <i>There was <b>bewilderment</b> at the shift of government policy.</i>
<b><u>daze</u></b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>His mother's death left him in a <b>daze</b>.</i>
<b><u>disbelief</u></b>	A rejection of belief. <i>I'll burn in hell for <b>disbelief</b>.</i>
<b><u>dread</u></b>	Dreadlocks. <i>Lyon combed his fingers through Curtis <b>dreads</b>.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>I should <b>esteem</b> it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
<b><u>exclamation</u></b>	A sudden cry or remark expressing surprise, strong emotion, or pain. <i>She gave an <b>exclamation</b> of delight.</i>
<b><u>flabbergasted</u></b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>The <b>flabbergasted</b> aldermen were speechless.</i>
<b>gasp</b>	Strain to obtain air by gasping. <i>She gave a <b>gasp</b> and fainted.</i>
<b><u>homage</u></b>	Special honour or respect shown publicly. <i>Many villagers come here to pay <b>homage</b> to the Virgin.</i>
<b>honor</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>We <b>honor</b> checks and drafts.</i>
<b>incredulity</b>	The state of being unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b><u>inspiring</u></b>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>He was an <b>inspiring</b> teacher.</i>
<b><u>motivational</u></b>	Relating to the reason or reasons for acting or behaving in a particular way. <i>Fear is used as a <b>motivational</b> tool.</i>
<b>mystification</b>	The activity of obscuring people's understanding, leaving them baffled or bewildered.
<b>respect</b>	The state of being admired or respected. <i>She was <b>respected</b> by everyone she worked with.</i>
<b>reverence</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>The messenger made his <b>reverence</b>.</i>

<b>scare</b>	Become scared. <i>A bomb <b>scare</b> led them to evacuate the building.</i>
<b>serendipity</b>	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b>.</i>
<b>startle</b>	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>He was <b>startled</b> to see a column of smoke.</i>
<b>stupefy</b>	Astonish and shock. <i>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.</i>
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>He <b>surprised</b> a gang stealing scrap metal.</i>
<b>surprised</b>	Feeling or showing surprise. <i>There was a <b>surprised</b> silence.</i>
<b>wonder</b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>A <b>wonder</b> drug.</i>
