Awed as an Adjective

Definitions of "Awed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “awed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having or showing a feeling of mixed reverence and respect and wonder and dread.*
- *Inspired by a feeling of fearful wonderment or reverence.*
- *Filled with awe or wonder.*



Synonyms of "Awed" as an adjective (3 Words)

- awestricken** Having or showing a feeling of mixed reverence and respect and wonder and dread.
- awestruck** Having or showing a feeling of mixed reverence and respect and wonder and dread.
*In grim despair and **awestruck** wonder.*
- awful** Inspired by a feeling of fearful wonderment or reverence.
***Awful** worshippers with bowed heads.*



Usage Examples of "Awed" as an adjective

- *I watched her in awed silence.*
- *He spoke in a hushed, awed whisper.*
- *Awed by the silence.*
- *Stood in awed silence before the shrine.*



Associations of "Awed" (30 Words)

- admiration** Respect and warm approval.
*A small token in **admiration** of your works.*
- amaze** Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment.
*He has been **amazed** by the quality of the employees at the bank.*
- amazement** The feeling that accompanies something extremely surprising.
*She shook her head in **amazement**.*
- astonish** Affect with wonder.
*You never fail to **astonish** me.*
- astonished** Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.
*He was **astonished** at the change in him.*
- astonishment** Great surprise.
*She looked at him in **astonishment**.*

astound	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness astounded him.</i>
<u>bewilderment</u>	Confusion resulting from failure to understand. <i>The three of them looked at him in bewilderment.</i>
<u>daze</u>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>He was walking around in a daze.</i>
<u>disbelief</u>	A rejection of belief. <i>Laura shook her head in disbelief.</i>
<u>dread</u>	Greatly feared dreadful. <i>He was stricken with the dread disease and died.</i>
esteem	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>I should esteem it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
<u>exclamation</u>	An abrupt excited utterance. <i>An exclamation of amazement.</i>
<u>flabbergasted</u>	Greatly surprised or astonished. <i>Flabbergasted fans took to the streets to celebrate the team's big win.</i>
gasp	Strain to obtain air by gasping. <i>She gave a gasp and fainted.</i>
<u>homage</u>	Formal public acknowledgement of feudal allegiance. <i>A man doing homage to his personal lord.</i>
honor	The state of being honored. <i>A man of honor.</i>
incredulity	The state of being unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i>
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very inspiring.</i>
<u>motivational</u>	Designed to promote the desire or willingness to do or achieve something. <i>A motivational speech.</i>
mystification	The activity of obscuring people's understanding, leaving them baffled or bewildered.
respect	The state of being admired or respected. <i>The government's record in this respect is a mixed one.</i>
reverence	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>The many divine beings reverenced by Hindu tradition.</i>
<u>scare</u>	Become scared. <i>The rapid questions were designed to scare her into blurting out the truth.</i>

serendipity	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of serendipity.</i>
<u>startle</u>	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>The loud noise startled him awake.</i>
stupefy	Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and stupefy their grandparents.</i>
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>Surprise major.</i>
surprised	Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment. <i>There was a surprised silence.</i>
wonder	A thing or a quality of something that causes wonder. <i>If I feel compassion for her it is not to be wondered at.</i>
