Associations of "Awkwardly" (30 Words)

amateurish	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>Her amateurish interviewing technique.</i>
<u>ashamed</u>	Embarrassed or guilty because of one’s actions, characteristics, or associations. <i>I m ashamed to say I followed him home.</i>
<u>blush</u>	Show shyness, embarrassment, or shame by becoming red in the face. <i>He had brought a faint blush to her cheeks.</i>
bulky	(of a person) heavily built. <i>A bulky carrier bag.</i>
clumsy	Showing lack of skill or aptitude. <i>The legal procedure is far too clumsy.</i>
cumbersome	Slow or complicated and therefore inefficient. <i>A cumbersome piece of machinery.</i>
<u>disgraceful</u>	Shockingly unacceptable. <i>It is disgraceful that they should be denied unemployment benefits.</i>
embarrassing	Causing to feel shame or chagrin or vexation. <i>An embarrassing muddle.</i>
embarrassment	A person or thing causing feelings of embarrassment. <i>I turned red with embarrassment.</i>
<u>flush</u>	The device used for flushing a toilet. <i>The grouse were flushed from the woods.</i>
forgetful	(of memory) deficient in retentiveness or range. <i>I m a bit forgetful these days.</i>
gaffe	A socially awkward or tactless act. <i>His comments are a major diplomatic gaffe.</i>
gauche	Lacking social polish. <i>Too gauche to leave the room when the conversation became intimate.</i>

gawky	Nervously awkward and ungainly. <i>A gawky lad with long ungainly legs.</i>
graceless	Lacking graciousness. <i>He wanted to speak so as not to seem sullen or graceless.</i>
<u>humiliating</u>	Causing awareness of your shortcomings. <i>A humiliating defeat.</i>
ignominious	Deserving or causing public disgrace or shame. <i>An ignominious retreat.</i>
inelegant	(of language) unpolished. <i>He came skidding to an inelegant halt.</i>
loutish	Ill-mannered and coarse and contemptible in behavior or appearance. <i>The loutish manners of a bully.</i>
maladroit	Not adroit. <i>Both men are unhappy about the maladroit way the matter has been handled.</i>
poser	A person who poses; a poseur.
<u>shame</u>	Bring shame to. <i>She shamed him into making amends.</i>
<u>shameful</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>The wicked rascally shameful conduct of the bankrupt.</i>
solecism	A breach of good manners; an instance of incorrect behaviour.
strange	Unusual or surprising; difficult to understand or explain. <i>It is strange how things change.</i>
ungainly	Difficult to handle or manage especially because of shape. <i>An ungainly walk.</i>
<u>unpleasant</u>	(of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude. <i>An unpleasant personality.</i>
unskillful	Poorly done. <i>It was an unskillful attempt.</i>
unwieldy	Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape. <i>Huge unwieldy arc lamps.</i>
<u>weird</u>	Strikingly odd or unusual- Bram Stoker. <i>Blue eyes weirded him out and Ivan s were especially creepy.</i>
