## Associations of "Awoke" (30 Words)

<a href="#">afternoon</a>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>He spent a quiet <b>afternoon</b> in the park.</i>
<b>awaken</b>	Make someone aware of (something) for the first time. <i>Anna was <b>awakened</b> by the telephone.</i>
<a href="#">bedtime</a>	The usual time when someone goes to bed. <i>It was well past her <b>bedtime</b>.</i>
<b>conscious</b>	Intentionally conceived. <i>A <b>conscious</b> policy.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	Become clear or enter one’s consciousness or emotions. <i>Thursday <b>dawned</b> bright and sunny.</i>
<b>day</b>	The part of a day when it is light the time between sunrise and sunset. <i>These <b>days</b> it is not unusual.</i>
<b>daybreak</b>	The time in the morning when daylight first appears; dawn. <i>She set off at <b>daybreak</b>.</i>
<b>doze</b>	Sleep lightly or for a short period of time. <i>I <b>dozed</b> off for a few seconds.</i>
<a href="#">dreaming</a>	A series of mental images and emotions occurring during sleep.
<b>insomnia</b>	Habitual sleeplessness; inability to sleep.
<a href="#">lucid</a>	Showing or having the ability to think clearly, especially in intervals between periods of confusion or insanity. <i>Pell<b>lucid</b> prose.</i>
<a href="#">midnight</a>	12 o’clock at night; the middle of the night. <i>Young children should not be allowed to stay up until <b>midnight</b>.</i>
<b>monday</b>	The second day of the week; the first working day.
<a href="#">morning</a>	Every morning. <i>It was a beautiful sunny <b>morning</b>.</i>

<b>nap</b>	A soft or fuzzy surface texture. <i>There wasn't time for a <b>nap</b>.</i>
<b>night</b>	Nightfall. <i>He watched television every <b>night</b>.</i>
<b>nightmare</b>	A terrifying or deeply upsetting dream. <i>I had <b>nightmares</b> after watching the horror movie.</i>
<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>oversleep</b>	Sleep longer than intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She <b>roused</b> and looked around.</i>
<b>sleep</b>	Typically in the context of anticipating a forthcoming event a night or a night's sleep. <i>He didn't get enough <b>sleep</b> last night.</i>
<b>sleepless</b>	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness. <i>Lisa lay <b>sleepless</b>.</i>
<b>slumber</b>	Be asleep. <i>The village street <b>slumbered</b> under the afternoon sun.</i>
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<b>tonight</b>	During the night of the present day. <i><b>Tonight</b> is a night to remember.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Be awake be alert be there. <i>He needs to <b>wake</b> up to reality.</i>
<b>wakeful</b>	Easily disturbed. <i>A restless <b>wakeful</b> night.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Stop sleeping. <i>They combined to <b>waken</b> a forgotten and futile hope.</i>
<b>waking</b>	The state of remaining awake. <i>Worked every moment of my <b>waking</b> hours.</i>
<b>wednesday</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
