<b>aphoristic</b>	Containing aphorisms or maxims.
<b>axiomatical</b>	Of or relating to or derived from axioms.
<b>postulational</b>	Of or relating to or derived from axioms- S.S.Stevens. <i>The <b>postulational</b> method was applied to geometry.</i>
<b>self-evident</b>	Evident without proof or argument.
<b><u>undeniable</u></b>	Not possible to deny. <i>It is an <b>undeniable</b> fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>

**unquestionable** Not counterfeit or copied.  
An **unquestionable** antique.

## Associations of "Axiomatic" (30 Words)

<b>analytic</b>	True by virtue of the meaning of the words or concepts used to express it, so that its denial would be a self-contradiction. An <b>analytical</b> mind.
<b>analytical</b>	Using or skilled in using analysis (i.e., separating a whole-intellectual or substantial-into its elemental parts or basic principles). <b>Analytical</b> reasoning.
<b>apparent</b>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. The effects of the drought are <b>apparent</b> to anyone who sees the parched fields.
<b>blatant</b>	Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <b>Blatant</b> radios.
<b>confirming</b>	Indicating existence or presence of a suspected condition or pathogen.
<b>deducible</b>	Capable of being deduced.
<b>deductive</b>	Involving inferences from general principles. I used my <b>deductive</b> powers.
<b>demonstrable</b>	Capable of being demonstrated or proved- Walter Bagehot. The <b>demonstrable</b> injustices of racism.
<b>detectable</b>	Capable of being detected. There is a <b>detectable</b> note of bitterness when he talks of his father.
<b>evident</b>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. A clearly <b>evident</b> erasure in the manuscript.
<b>explicit</b>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. The arrangement had not been made <b>explicit</b> .

<b>formal</b>	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e g of formal dress. <i>A <b>formal</b> education.</i>
<b>incontestable</b>	Not able to be disputed.
<b>logic</b>	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine s representation of logical operations. <i>Experience is a better guide to this than deductive <b>logic</b>.</i>
<b>logical</b>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The information is displayed in a simple and <b>logical</b> fashion.</i>
<b>manifest</b>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>A disorder that usually <b>manifests</b> in middle age.</i>
<b>method</b>	The quality of being well organized and systematic in thought or action. <i>Labour intensive production <b>methods</b>.</i>
<b>noticeable</b>	Undesirably noticeable. <i><b>Noticeable</b> shadows under her eyes.</i>
<b>observable</b>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>An <b>observable</b> change in behavior.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>It was an <b>obvious</b> remark to make.</i>
<b>overtly</b>	In an overt manner. <i>Some of the narrative is <b>overtly</b> sexual.</i>
<b>palpability</b>	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<b>perspicuous</b>	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. <i>It provides simpler and more <b>perspicuous</b> explanations than its rivals.</i>
<b>reasoned</b>	Logically valid. <i>A <b>reasoned</b> judgement.</i>
<b>reasoning</b>	Thinking that is coherent and logical. <i>He explained the <b>reasoning</b> behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
<b>syllogism</b>	Deductive reasoning as distinct from induction. <i>This school of epistemology is highly advanced in <b>syllogism</b> and logical reasoning.</i>
<b>tangible</b>	(of especially business assets) having physical substance and intrinsic monetary value. <i>The emphasis is now on <b>tangible</b> results.</i>
<b>undoubtedly</b>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>It s <b>undoubtedly</b> very beautiful.</i>

**unmistakable** Clearly evident to the mind.  
*The **unmistakable** sound of his laughter.*

**verifiable** Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified.  
*An easily **verifiable** claim.*
