Associations of "Back and forth" (30 Words)

<u>anachronism</u>	Something located at a time when it could not have existed or occurred. <i>It is anachronism to suppose that the official morality of the age was mere window dressing.</i>
backslide	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to backslide.</i>
backward	(of a fielding position) behind an imaginary line passing through the stumps at the batsman’s end at right angles to the wicket. <i>Backward square leg.</i>
backwards	In reverse of the usual direction or order. <i>Count backwards from twenty to ten.</i>
behind	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>She slid inelegantly down a few steps on her behind.</i>
degeneracy	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>A slide into moral degeneracy.</i>
degeneration	Passing from a more complex to a simpler biological form. <i>Overgrazing has caused serious degeneration of grassland.</i>
discontinuity	A break in or lack of continuity. <i>There is no significant discontinuity between modern and primitive societies.</i>
inverse	Opposite or contrary in position, direction, order, or effect. <i>Inverse logarithms.</i>
later	At some eventual time in the future. <i>A later symptom of the disease.</i>
past	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the past. <i>The past year.</i>

posterior	Relating to or denoting presentation of a fetus in which the rear or caudal end is nearest the cervix and emerges first at birth. <i>The posterior part of the gut.</i>
posthumous	Occurring or coming into existence after a person's death. <i>He was awarded a posthumous Military Cross.</i>
<u>regress</u>	Calculate the coefficient or coefficients of regression of a variable against or on another variable. <i>They would not regress to pre technological tribalism.</i>
<u>regression</u>	A lessening of the severity of a disease or its symptoms. <i>It is easy to blame unrest on economic regression.</i>
regressive	Relating to or marked by psychological regression. <i>Regressive aspects of recent local government reform.</i>
<u>relapse</u>	A failure to maintain a higher state. <i>He responded well to treatment but then suffered a relapse.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>Published restorations are dodgy based on single bones.</i>
retrace	Trace (something) back to its source or beginning. <i>He began to retrace his steps to the station car park.</i>
retreat	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>It becomes so hot that the lizards retreat into the shade.</i>
<u>retroactive</u>	Affecting things past. <i>Retroactive tax increase.</i>
retrograde	Show retrograde motion. <i>A retrograde flow.</i>
retrogression	The process of returning to an earlier state, typically a worse one. <i>A retrogression to 19th century attitudes.</i>
<u>retrospect</u>	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. <i>In retrospect.</i>
retrospective	Concerned with or related to the past. <i>Our survey was retrospective.</i>
return	A returning officer's announcement of an election result. <i>A return flight.</i>
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>He was given a promise of the reversion of Boraston's job.</i>
<u>revert</u>	Reply or respond to someone. <i>We texted both Farah and Shirish but neither of them reverted.</i>

throwback

A reversion to an earlier ancestral characteristic.

*A lot of his work is a **throwback** to the fifties.*

ventral

Toward or on or near the belly (front of a primate or lower surface of a lower animal).

***Ventral** or pelvic fins correspond to the hind limbs of a quadruped.*
