context	The circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood. <i>The proposals need to be considered in the context of new European directives.</i>
desktop	The working area of a computer screen regarded as a representation of a notional desktop and containing icons representing items such as files. <i>You can now have multiple overlapping windows on the desktop.</i>
education	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Education is a preparation for life.</i>
environment	The area in which something exists or lives. <i>A parliamentary environment committee.</i>
experience	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>A man of experience.</i>
family circumstances	An association of people who share common beliefs or activities.
framework	A structure supporting or containing something. <i>A conservatory in a delicate framework of iron.</i>

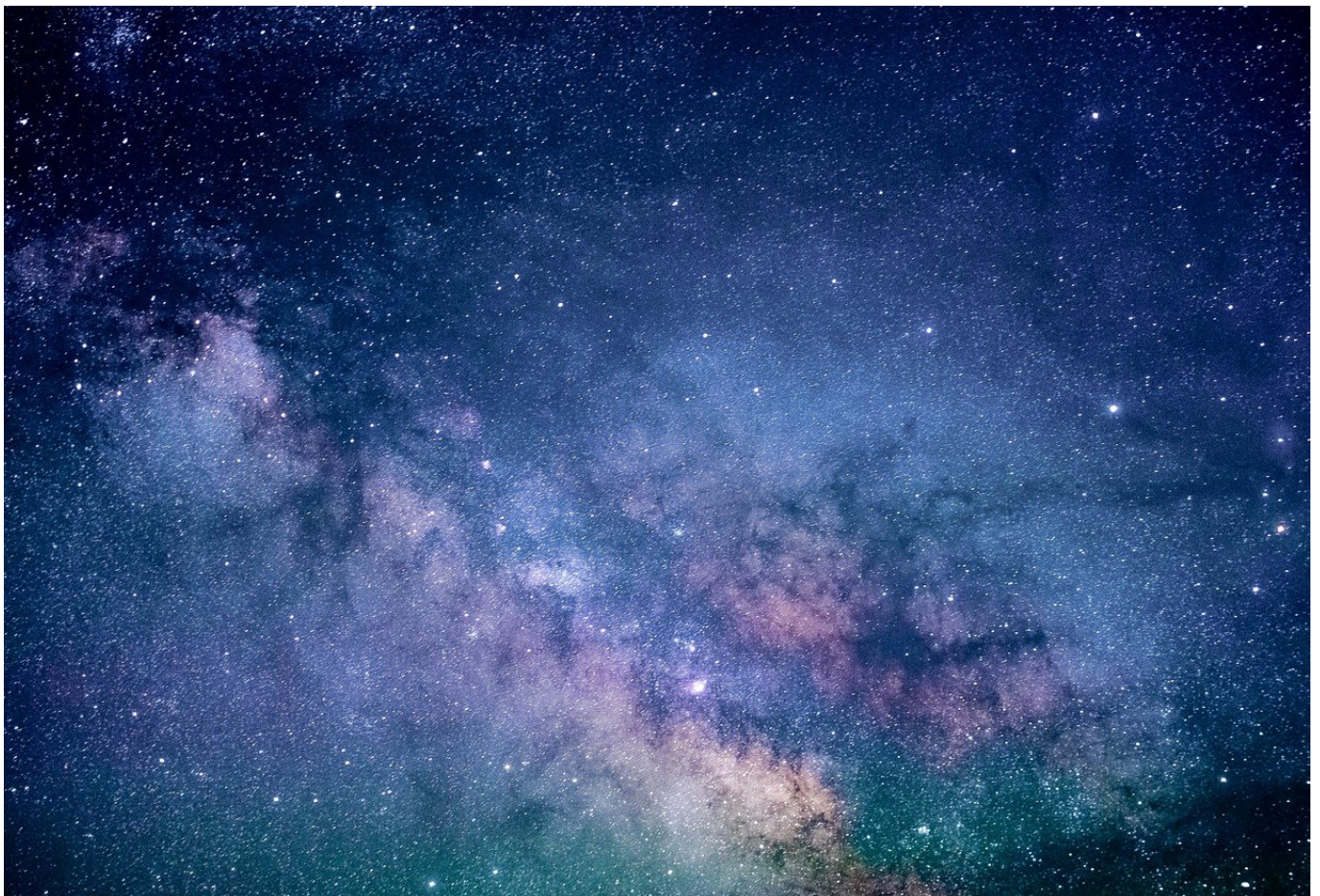
ground	Relating to actions or activities taking place on the ground rather than the air. <i>They called for a retrial on the grounds of the new evidence.</i>
grounding	The surface (as a wall or canvas) prepared to take the paint for a painting. <i>A good grounding in mathematics.</i>
history	The aggregate of past events. <i>The group has quite a history.</i>
in the distance	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
knowledge	Information held on a computer system. <i>Her considerable knowledge of antiques.</i>
<u>milieu</u>	The environmental condition. <i>Gregory came from the same aristocratic milieu as Sidonius.</i>
on the horizon	The great circle on the celestial sphere whose plane passes through the sensible horizon and the center of the Earth.
out of the limelight	A failure by a batter or runner to reach a base safely in baseball.
out of the public eye	A failure by a batter or runner to reach a base safely in baseball.
out of the spotlight	A failure by a batter or runner to reach a base safely in baseball.
past	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the past. <i>The monuments act as guidelines through the country s colourful past.</i>
record	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He held the world record for over a decade.</i>
scenario	A postulated sequence of possible events. <i>The scenario is France during the Reign of Terror.</i>
<u>scene</u>	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>I don t go out into the scene now.</i>
<u>scope</u>	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Infrared night scopes.</i>
screen background	A protective covering consisting of netting; can be mounted in a frame.

setting	The set of facts or circumstances that surround a situation or event. <i>A setting of Yevtushenko's bleak poem.</i>
situation	A set of circumstances in which one finds oneself; a state of affairs. <i>Eternal truths will be neither true nor eternal unless they have fresh meaning for every new social situation.</i>
social circumstances	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
<u>surround</u>	The area encircling something surroundings. <i>An oak fireplace surround.</i>
surroundings	The environmental condition. <i>I took up the time admiring my surroundings.</i>
training	The result of good upbringing (especially knowledge of correct social behavior). <i>You'll have to go into strict training.</i>

contextual	Depending on the preceding or following parts of a text to clarify meaning. <i>He included contextual information in footnotes.</i>
diorama	A model representing a scene with three-dimensional figures, either in miniature or as a large-scale museum exhibit.
environ	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle. <i>The stone circle was enviored by an expanse of peat soil.</i>
environment	The natural world, as a whole or in a particular geographical area, especially as affected by human activity. <i>He longed for the comfortable environment of his living room.</i>
foreground	Move into the foreground to make more visible or prominent. <i>The intricate garden depicted in the foreground.</i>
homocentric	Having a common center.
landscape	The genre of landscape painting. <i>The site has been tastefully landscaped.</i>
locale	A place where something happens or is set, or that has particular events associated with it. <i>Her summers were spent in a variety of exotic locales.</i>
milieu	A person's social environment. <i>Gregory came from the same aristocratic milieu as Sidonius.</i>
nature	The essential qualities or characteristics by which something is recognized. <i>I m not violent by nature.</i>
panorama	The visual percept of a region. <i>The galleries will offer a full panorama of 20th century art.</i>
panoramic	Including all aspects of a subject; wide-ranging. <i>A panoramic view.</i>
perspective	The appearance of viewed objects with regard to their relative position, distance from the viewer, etc. <i>Most guidebook history is written from the editor s perspective.</i>
picturesque	Strikingly expressive. <i>The salad has no regional or picturesque name.</i>
polychrome	Color with many colors make polychrome. <i>Modigliani continued to carve his large heads sometimes in polychrome until 1916.</i>

pomp	Vain and ostentatious display. <i>I perceived Captain Delmar in all the pomp and pride of full uniform.</i>
scene	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>I don't go out into the scene now.</i>
scenery	The appearance of a place. <i>They had all helped with scenery and costumes.</i>
scenic	Used of locations; having beautiful natural scenery. <i>The scenic route from Florence to Siena.</i>
setting	A speed, height, or temperature at which a machine or device can be adjusted to operate. <i>A place setting of sterling flatware.</i>
surroundings	The environmental condition. <i>I took up the time admiring my surroundings.</i>
sylvan	Consisting of or associated with woods; wooded. <i>A shady sylvan glade.</i>
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>Consider what follows from the positivist view.</i>
vista	A long, narrow view as between rows of trees or buildings, especially one closed by a building or other structure. <i>Sweeping lawns and landscaped vistas.</i>
