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Associations of "Bade" (30 Words)

absentee	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>Absentee pupils.</i>
<u>absenteeism</u>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
afresh	Again but in a new or different way. <i>Start afresh.</i>
<u>anew</u>	Once more; again. <i>Starting life anew in a fresh place.</i>
attendance	The frequency with which a person is present. <i>My attendance at church was very patchy.</i>
auctioneer	Sell at an auction.
command	The power or authority to command. <i>The corporation has just undergone a change in command.</i>
conscienceless	Lacking a conscience. <i>A conscienceless villain.</i>
<u>consumerism</u>	The preoccupation of society with the acquisition of consumer goods. <i>The growth of consumerism has led to many organizations improving their service to the customer.</i>
<u>covet</u>	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another). <i>I covet one of their smart bags.</i>
covetous	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>Jealous of his success and covetous of his possessions.</i>
<u>envious</u>	Feeling or showing envy. <i>An envious glance.</i>
excessive	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>

exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Exorbitant rent.</i>
<u>expensive</u>	Costing a lot of money. <i>An expensive bottle of wine.</i>
grasping	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>Grasping commercialism.</i>
greed	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Greed has taken over football.</i>
hope	Be optimistic be full of hope have hopes. <i>In spite of his troubles he never gave up hope.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate spending.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
<u>longing</u>	A yearning desire. <i>Her longing eyes.</i>
<u>morale</u>	The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time. <i>The team's morale was high.</i>
point	A decimal point. <i>He made the point that economic regulation involves controls on pricing.</i>
request	The verbal act of requesting. <i>She requested an extra bed in her room.</i>
starting	A turn to be a starter (in a game at the beginning). <i>His starting meant that the coach thought he was one of their best linemen.</i>
<u>unconscionable</u>	Unreasonably excessive. <i>The unconscionable conduct of his son.</i>
usurious	Relating to or characterized by usury; extortionate. <i>They lend money at usurious rates.</i>
want	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>For want of a better location we ate our picnic in the cemetery.</i>
weariness	Reluctance to see or experience any more of something. <i>Growing war weariness.</i>
<u>wish</u>	A thing that is or has been wished for. <i>They wish to become involved.</i>
