Synonyms of "Badinage" as a noun (8 Words)

banter	The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks. <i>There was much good natured banter.</i>
crosstalk	Unwanted transfer of signals between communication channels.
cut and thrust	The act of penetrating or opening open with a sharp edge.
raillery	Light teasing repartee. <i>She was greeted with raillery from her fellow workers.</i>
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>He had a quick mind and a splendid gift of repartee.</i>
swordplay	The activity or skill of fencing with swords or foils. <i>This intellectual swordplay went on for several minutes.</i>

wit	A witty person. <i>His caustic wit cuts through the humbug.</i>
wordplay	The witty exploitation of the meanings and ambiguities of words, especially in puns. <i>So many of the jokes are based on wordplay.</i>

Usage Examples of "Badinage" as a noun

- *He developed a nice line in badinage with the Labour leader.*

Associations of "Badinage" (30 Words)

amusement	A feeling of delight at being entertained. <i>An evening s amusement.</i>
amusing	Causing laughter and providing entertainment. <i>An amusing fellow.</i>
banter	Light teasing repartee. <i>There was much good natured banter.</i>
buffoonery	Behaviour that is ridiculous but amusing. <i>The film is full of wordplay and buffoonery.</i>
comedy	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>The conventions of romantic comedy have grown more appealing with the passage of time.</i>
comical	Amusing, especially in a ludicrous or absurd way. <i>A comical look of surprise.</i>
droll	Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. <i>A droll little man with a quiet tongue in cheek kind of humor.</i>
entertaining	Providing amusement or enjoyment. <i>A charming and entertaining companion.</i>
farce	The dramatic genre represented by farces. <i>The choreographed confusion of real farce.</i>
fun	A source of fun. <i>People watching is great fun.</i>
funny	Causing laughter or amusement; humorous. <i>I was trying to make a funny but failed miserably.</i>
hilarious	Boisterously merry. <i>Her hilarious novel.</i>

humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>The humors are blood and phlegm and yellow and black bile.</i>
humorous	Having or showing a sense of humour. <i>Humorous stories.</i>
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>In reading this stanza we ought to humour it with a corresponding tone of voice.</i>
jape	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>The childish jape of depositing a stink bomb in her locker.</i>
jest	Speak in a joking way. <i>He laughed uproariously at his own jest.</i>
jesting	The action of saying or doing something for amusement. <i>Laughing and jesting were out of the question.</i>
jocose	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>A jocose allusion.</i>
jocular	With humor. <i>His voice was jocular.</i>
joke	Make jokes talk humorously or flippantly. <i>She could laugh and joke with her colleagues.</i>
jolly	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He is jolly busy.</i>
laugh	Produce laughter. <i>Many people only laughed at these stories.</i>
rebus	A puzzle in which words are represented by combinations of pictures and individual letters; for instance, apex might be represented by a picture of an ape followed by a letter X.
recreation	Activity that refreshes and recreates; activity that renews your health and spirits by enjoyment and relaxation. <i>Days of joyous recreation with his friends.</i>
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>He had a quick mind and a splendid gift of repartee.</i>
slapstick	Comedy based on deliberately clumsy actions and humorously embarrassing events. <i>Slapstick humour.</i>
waggish	Humorous in a playful, mischievous, or facetious manner. <i>Muskrat Castle as the house has been facetiously named by some waggish officer.</i>

witticism A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter.
*Maurice roared with laughter at his own **witticisms**.*
