<b>evening bag</b>	The early part of night (from dinner until bedtime) spent in a special way.

<b>gladstone bag</b>	Mammary gland of bovids (cows and sheep and goats).

<b>shoulder bag</b>	A cut of meat including the upper joint of the foreleg.
<b>suitcase</b>	A case with a handle and a hinged lid, used for carrying clothes and other personal possessions. <i>Three huge <b>suitcases</b> and a plethora of hand baggage.</i>
