<a href="#">acting</a>	Temporarily doing the duties of another person. <i>She studied <b>acting</b> in New York.</i>
<b>album</b>	A book of blank pages with pockets or envelopes; for organizing photographs or stamp collections etc. <i>His debut <b>album</b> was very much influenced by the jazz sound.</i>
<a href="#">artistic</a>	Having or revealing natural creative skill. <i>A denial of <b>artistic</b> freedom.</i>
<b>ballet</b>	An artistic dance form performed to music using precise and highly formalized set steps and gestures Classical ballet which originated in Renaissance Italy and established its present form during the 19th century is characterized by light graceful movements and the use of pointe shoes with reinforced toes. <i>The Bolshoi <b>Ballet</b>.</i>
<b>choreograph</b>	Plan and control (an event or operation). <i>The committee <b>choreographs</b> the movement of troops.</i>
<b>choreographer</b>	Someone who creates new dances. <i>A professional <b>choreographer</b>.</i>
<a href="#">choreography</a>	The art or practice of designing choreographic sequences. <i>As well as dancing she did a great deal of <b>choreography</b>.</i>
<b>classical</b>	(physics) relating to or based on concepts that preceded the theories of relativity and quantum mechanics. <i><b>Classical</b> ballet.</i>
<a href="#">dance</a>	Dance steps and movements considered as an activity or art form. <i>Sheila <b>danced</b> in gaily.</i>
<b>dancer</b>	A person who dances or whose profession is dancing. <i>She thought he would become a ballet <b>dancer</b>.</i>
<b>dancing</b>	The activity of dancing for pleasure or in order to entertain others. <i>There will be folk music singing and <b>dancing</b>.</i>
<b>disco</b>	Popular dance music especially in the late 1970s melodic with a regular bass beat intended mainly for dancing at discotheques. <i>No one knows how to waltz so I ve ordered a <b>disco</b>.</i>
<b>eurhythmics</b>	The interpretation in harmonious bodily movements of the rhythm of musical compositions; used to teach musical understanding.
<a href="#">festival</a>	An organized series of concerts, plays, or films, typically one held annually in the same place. <i>Traditional Jewish <b>festivals</b>.</i>

<b><u>genre</u></b>	Denoting or relating to a style of painting depicting scenes from ordinary life, typically domestic situations, associated particularly with 17th-century Dutch and Flemish artists. <i>The science fiction <b>genre</b>.</i>
<b>hop</b>	A hopping movement. <i>A short <b>hop</b> by cab from Soho.</i>
<b>jingle</b>	A metallic sound. <i>He makes up advertising <b>jingles</b>.</i>
<b>kachina</b>	A person who represents a kachina in ceremonial dances.
<b>mazurka</b>	Music composed for dancing the mazurka.
<b>morris</b>	United States suffragist in Wyoming (1814-1902).
<b>music</b>	The art or science of composing or performing music. <i>He fell asleep to the <b>music</b> of the wind chimes.</i>
<b>opera</b>	A building for the performance of opera. <i>It was the best performance of the <b>opera</b> he had ever heard.</i>
<b>pas</b>	(ballet) a step in dancing (especially in classical ballet).
<b>pirouette</b>	Do a pirouette usually as part of a dance. <i>She <b>pirouetted</b> and made a bow.</i>
<b>playing</b>	The act of playing a musical instrument.
<b>polka</b>	Dance the polka. <i><b>Polkas</b> are danced to sprightly music in 2 4 time.</i>
<b>quadrille</b>	A piece of music for a quadrille. <i>A 32 horse <b>quadrille</b>.</i>
<b><u>repertoire</u></b>	A stock of skills or types of behaviour that a person habitually uses. <i>The mainstream concert <b>repertoire</b>.</i>
<b>rhythm</b>	The basic rhythmic unit in a piece of music. <i>In Art Nouveau the flow and <b>rhythm</b> of a design became pre eminent.</i>
<b>techno</b>	A style of fast, heavy electronic dance music, typically with few or no vocals.
