## **Bandit as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Bandit" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bandit” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.*
- *An enemy aircraft.*
- *A robber or outlaw belonging to a gang and typically operating in an isolated or lawless area.*



## Synonyms of "Bandit" as a noun (4 Words)

**brigand** An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.

A robber who takes property by threatening or performing violence on the person  
**mugger** who is robbed (usually on the street).

*The **mugger** snatched my purse and ran away.*

Someone who takes spoils or plunder (as in war).  
**raider** Masked **raiders** burst into the 100 seater restaurant.

**robber** A person who commits robbery.



## Usage Examples of "Bandit" as a noun

- *The bandit produced a weapon and demanded money.*





## Associations of "Bandit" (30 Words)

<b>arrest</b>	The action of seizing someone and taking them into custody. <i>They placed her under <b>arrest</b>.</i>
<b><u>brigand</u></b>	A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.
<b>burgle</b>	Commit a burglary; enter and rob a dwelling. <i>Our house in London has been <b>burgled</b>.</i>
<b>cattle</b>	Animals of a group related to domestic cattle including yak bison and buffaloes. <i>So many head of <b>cattle</b>.</i>
<b>criminal</b>	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>A <b>criminal</b> offence.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<b>felonious</b>	Relating to or of the nature of felony. <i><b>Felonious</b> intent.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Showing a sense of guilt. <i>A <b>guilty</b> secret.</i>
<b>illegalize</b>	Declare illegal; outlaw.
<b>illicit</b>	Contrary to or forbidden by law. <i><b>Illicit</b> sex.</i>
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b>malefactor</b>	A person who commits a crime or some other wrong.
<b>offense</b>	A feeling of anger caused by being offended.
<b><u>outlaw</u></b>	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>Secondary picketing has been <b>outlawed</b>.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>Artworks <b>pillaged</b> from churches and museums.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>The fruits of violence and <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>recidivist</b>	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be <b>recidivist</b> than other criminals.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>The burglars <b>robbed</b> him of all his money.</i>

<b>robber</b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b>rustler</b>	A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep. <i>Police have so far arrested 649 <b>rustlers</b> countrywide.</i>
<b>shoplift</b>	Steal in a store. <i>She was caught <b>shoplifting</b> a pair of shoes.</i>
<b>shoplifting</b>	The action of stealing goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade s euphemism for <b>shoplifting</b>.</i>
<b>steal</b>	Steal a base. <i>The chorus is a <b>steal</b> from The Smiths London.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest <b>theft</b> happened at a garage.</i>
<b>thief</b>	A criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention of keeping it or selling it. <i>The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.</i>
<b>thievery</b>	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty <b>thievery</b>.</i>
<b>transgression</b>	The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of marine strata over terrestrial strata. <i>The boy was punished for the <b>transgressions</b> of his father.</i>
<b>unlawful</b>	Not morally right or permissible. <i>The use of <b>unlawful</b> violence.</i>
<b>vagrancy</b>	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into <b>vagrancy</b> and drug abuse.</i>
