Bandit as a Noun

Definitions of "Bandit" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bandit” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.*
- *An enemy aircraft.*
- *A robber or outlaw belonging to a gang and typically operating in an isolated or lawless area.*



Synonyms of "Bandit" as a noun (4 Words)

brigand An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.

A robber who takes property by threatening or performing violence on the person who is robbed (usually on the street).

mugger *The **mugger** snatched my purse and ran away.*

Someone who takes spoils or plunder (as in war).
raider *Masked **raiders** burst into the 100 seater restaurant.*

robber A person who commits robbery.



Usage Examples of "Bandit" as a noun

- *The bandit produced a weapon and demanded money.*



Associations of "Bandit" (30 Words)

arrest	The action of seizing someone and taking them into custody. <i>They placed her under arrest.</i>
<u>brigand</u>	A member of a gang that ambushes and robs people in forests and mountains.
burgle	Commit a burglary; enter and rob a dwelling. <i>Our house in London has been burgled.</i>
cattle	Animals of a group related to domestic cattle including yak bison and buffaloes. <i>So many head of cattle.</i>
criminal	Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>A criminal offence.</i>
despoil	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i>
felonious	Relating to or of the nature of felony. <i>Felonious intent.</i>
guilty	Showing a sense of guilt. <i>A guilty secret.</i>
illegalize	Declare illegal; outlaw.
illicit	Contrary to or forbidden by law. <i>Illicit sex.</i>
larceny	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
malefactor	A person who commits a crime or some other wrong.
offense	A feeling of anger caused by being offended.
<u>outlaw</u>	Declare illegal outlaw. <i>Secondary picketing has been outlawed.</i>
pillage	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>Artworks pillaged from churches and museums.</i>
rapine	The violent seizure of someone's property. <i>The fruits of violence and rapine.</i>
recidivist	Relating to recidivists. <i>Research reveals that murderers are less likely to be recidivist than other criminals.</i>
rob	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>The burglars robbed him of all his money.</i>

robber	A person who commits robbery.
rustler	A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep. <i>Police have so far arrested 649 rustlers countrywide.</i>
shoplift	Steal in a store. <i>She was caught shoplifting a pair of shoes.</i>
shoplifting	The action of stealing goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
steal	Steal a base. <i>The chorus is a steal from The Smiths London.</i>
theft	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>The latest theft happened at a garage.</i>
thief	A criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention of keeping it or selling it. <i>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.</i>
thievery	The act of taking something from someone unlawfully. <i>Petty thievery.</i>
transgression	The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of marine strata over terrestrial strata. <i>The boy was punished for the transgressions of his father.</i>
unlawful	Not morally right or permissible. <i>The use of unlawful violence.</i>
vagrancy	The state of living as a vagrant; homelessness. <i>A descent into vagrancy and drug abuse.</i>
