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Associations of "Banished" (30 Words)

abolition	The action of abolishing a system, practice, or institution. <i>The abolition of the death penalty.</i>
abolitionism	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
abolitionist	A reformer who favors abolishing slavery. <i>The abolitionist movement.</i>
<u>asylum</u>	A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person. <i>His asylum application was refused.</i>
avoid	Refrain from certain foods or beverages. <i>During Ramadan Muslims avoid tobacco during the day.</i>
<u>coup</u>	A sudden and decisive change of government illegally or by force. <i>It was a major coup to get such a prestigious contract.</i>
cutout	A photograph from which the background has been cut away.
defrock	Divest of the frock; of church officials. <i>The Supreme Court found him in contempt of the tribunal and defrocked him as an appeals court judge.</i>
deport	Behave in a certain manner. <i>He was deported to Turkey for his public condemnation of the Shah.</i>
deportation	The expulsion from a country of an undesirable alien. <i>A deportation order.</i>
depose	Remove from office suddenly and forcefully. <i>Every affidavit shall state which of the facts deposed to are within the deponent s knowledge.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>Ninety ships were queuing to discharge.</i>
dispossession	The action of depriving someone of land, property, or other possessions. <i>Reparation for the victims of land dispossession.</i>

eject	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>He put the plane in a nosedive and ejected.</i>
evict	Expel from one's property or force to move out by a legal process. <i>A single mother and her children have been evicted from their home.</i>
<u>exclusion</u>	The act of forcing out someone or something. <i>He had a hand in my exclusion from the committee.</i>
exile	A person who lives away from their native country, either from choice or compulsion. <i>The return of political exiles.</i>
expatriate	Send (a person or money) abroad. <i>The poet was then expatriated from France.</i>
<u>expel</u>	Force out (something), especially from the body. <i>She was expelled from school.</i>
extradite	Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed. <i>Brazil refused to extradite him to Britain.</i>
<u>ghetto</u>	Formerly the restricted quarter of many European cities in which Jews were required to live. <i>No escape from the ghetto of the typing pool.</i>
<u>imprison</u>	Confine as if in a prison. <i>The suspects were imprisoned without trial.</i>
intern	Work as an intern. <i>The family were interned for the duration of the war as enemy aliens.</i>
<u>ostracize</u>	Exclude from a society or group. <i>Themistocles was indeed out of favour at Athens by the end of the 470s when he was ostracized.</i>
oust	Remove and replace. <i>The word processor has ousted the typewriter.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>The Czar was overthrown.</i>
riddance	The act of removing or getting rid of something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not riddance or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
rout	A large evening party or reception. <i>The retreat degenerated into a rout.</i>
<u>shun</u>	Expel from a community or group. <i>He shunned fashionable society.</i>
