<b>bank clerk</b>	A financial institution that accepts deposits and channels the money into lending activities.
<b>bank teller</b>	An arrangement of similar objects in a row or in tiers.
<b>bursar</b>	A student who holds a bursary.
<b>business person</b>	An immediate objective.
<b><u>businessman</u></b>	A person engaged in commercial or industrial business (especially an owner or executive).
<b>businesswoman</b>	A female businessperson. <i>A successful and self-reliant <b>businesswoman</b>.</i>
<b>capitalist</b>	A person who invests capital in a business (especially a large business). <i>The creation of the factory system by nineteenth-century <b>capitalists</b>.</i>
<b>clerk</b>	A literate or scholarly person. <i>A wages <b>clerk</b>.</i>

<b>industrialist</b>	A person involved in the ownership and management of industry. <i>The exploitation of child labour by nineteenth century <b>industrialists</b>.</i>
<b>investor</b>	A person or organization that puts money into financial schemes, property, etc. with the expectation of achieving a profit. <i>Foreign <b>investors</b> in the British commercial property sector.</i>
<b>magnate</b>	A very wealthy or powerful businessman. <i>A property <b>magnate</b>.</i>
<b>purser</b>	An officer on a ship who keeps the accounts, especially the head steward on a passenger vessel.
<b>speculator</b>	A person who forms a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. <i><b>Speculators</b> about the nature of the cosmos.</i>
<b>stockbroker</b>	An agent in the buying and selling of stocks and bonds.
<b>teller</b>	A cashpoint machine. <i>A foul mouthed <b>teller</b> of lies.</i>
<b><u>treasurer</u></b>	The head of the Exchequer.
<b>tycoon</b>	A very wealthy or powerful businessman. <i>A newspaper <b>tycoon</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Banker" (30 Words)

- accountant** A person whose job is to keep, inspect, and analyse financial accounts.  
The occupation of maintaining and auditing records and preparing financial reports for a business.  
*They send me an **accounting** every month.*
- actuarial** Relating to actuaries or their work of compiling and analysing statistics to calculate insurance risks and premiums.  
*An **actuarial** consulting firm.*
- administrator** Someone who manages a government agency or department.  
*Hospital **administrators**.*
- amortize** Reduce or pay off (a debt) with regular payments.  
*Lands **amortized** without licence.*
- auditor** Someone who listens attentively.  
*So low was Deems s voice that his **auditors** had to give it close attention.*

<b>bookkeeper</b>	A person whose job is to keep records of the financial affairs of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a <b>bookkeeper</b>.</i>
<b>boss</b>	Excellent; outstanding. <i>The <b>boss</b> characters provide more than enough challenge.</i>
<b>bursar</b>	A student who holds a bursary.
<b><u>cashier</u></b>	A person handling payments and receipts in a shop, bank, or business. <i><b>Cashier</b> the literal sense of this word.</i>
<b>controller</b>	A person or thing that directs or regulates something. <i>The speed <b>controller</b> on his turntable was not working properly.</i>
<b>economist</b>	An expert in economics.
<b><u>employer</u></b>	A person or firm that employs workers. <i>The National Health Service was the largest <b>employer</b> in Europe.</i>
<b>financial</b>	The finances or financial situation of an organization or individual. <i>An independent <b>financial</b> adviser.</i>
<b>foreman</b>	(in a law court) a person who presides over a jury and speaks on its behalf. <i>If you want to leave early you have to ask the <b>foreman</b>.</i>
<b>fund</b>	Place or store up in a fund for accumulation. <i><b>Fund</b> a medical care plan.</i>
<b>installment</b>	A part of a published serial.
<b>investment</b>	The act of investing; laying out money or capital in an enterprise with the expectation of profit. <i>This job calls for the <b>investment</b> of some hard thinking.</i>
<b>manager</b>	Someone who controls resources and expenditures. <i>She was a good <b>manager</b> and could make a meal out of nothing.</i>
<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>A 60 000 <b>mortgage</b>.</i>
<b>organizer</b>	A lightweight consumer electronic device that looks like a hand-held computer but instead performs specific tasks; can serve as a diary or a personal database or a telephone or an alarm clock etc. <i>The <b>organizers</b> of the demonstration.</i>
<b><u>profession</u></b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After <b>profession</b> she taught in Maidenhead.</i>
<b>rich</b>	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Every day the split between the <b>rich</b> and the poor widens.</i>

**secretary**

A desk used for writing.

*She was **secretary** to David Wilby MP.*

**solicitor**

A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts.

*She had been a telephone **solicitor** for a Chicago newspaper.*

**storekeeper**

A shopkeeper.

**superintendent**

(in the US) a high-ranking official, especially the chief of a police department.

*The **superintendent** registrar.*

**supervise**

Observe and direct the work of (someone).

*The sergeant left to **supervise** the loading of the lorries.*

**treasurer**

The head of the Exchequer.

**underwrite**

Protect by insurance.

*They were willing to **underwrite** in part the construction of a ship.*
