bank clerk	A financial institution that accepts deposits and channels the money into lending activities.
bank teller	An arrangement of similar objects in a row or in tiers.
bursar	A student who holds a bursary.
business person	An immediate objective.
<u>businessman</u>	A person engaged in commercial or industrial business (especially an owner or executive).
businesswoman	A female businessperson. <i>A successful and self reliant businesswoman.</i>
capitalist	A person who invests capital in a business (especially a large business). <i>The creation of the factory system by nineteenth century capitalists.</i>
clerk	A literate or scholarly person. <i>A wages clerk.</i>

industrialist	A person involved in the ownership and management of industry. <i>The exploitation of child labour by nineteenth century industrialists.</i>
investor	A person or organization that puts money into financial schemes, property, etc. with the expectation of achieving a profit. <i>Foreign investors in the British commercial property sector.</i>
magnate	A very wealthy or powerful businessman. <i>A property magnate.</i>
purser	An officer on a ship who keeps the accounts, especially the head steward on a passenger vessel.
speculator	A person who forms a theory or conjecture about a subject without firm evidence. <i>Speculators about the nature of the cosmos.</i>
stockbroker	An agent in the buying and selling of stocks and bonds.
teller	A cashpoint machine. <i>A foul mouthed teller of lies.</i>
<u>treasurer</u>	The head of the Exchequer.
tycoon	A very wealthy or powerful businessman. <i>A newspaper tycoon.</i>

- accountant** A person whose job is to keep, inspect, and analyse financial accounts.
The occupation of maintaining and auditing records and preparing financial reports for a business.
*They send me an **accounting** every month.*
- actuarial** Relating to actuaries or their work of compiling and analysing statistics to calculate insurance risks and premiums.
*An **actuarial** consulting firm.*
- administrator** Someone who manages a government agency or department.
*Hospital **administrators**.*
- amortize** Reduce or pay off (a debt) with regular payments.
*Lands **amortized** without licence.*
- auditor** Someone who listens attentively.

bookkeeper	A person whose job is to keep records of the financial affairs of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a bookkeeper.</i>
boss	Excellent; outstanding. <i>The boss characters provide more than enough challenge.</i>
bursar	A student who holds a bursary.
<u>cashier</u>	A person handling payments and receipts in a shop, bank, or business. <i>Cashier the literal sense of this word.</i>
controller	A person or thing that directs or regulates something. <i>The speed controller on his turntable was not working properly.</i>
economist	An expert in economics.
<u>employer</u>	A person or firm that employs workers. <i>The National Health Service was the largest employer in Europe.</i>
financial	The finances or financial situation of an organization or individual. <i>An independent financial adviser.</i>
foreman	(in a law court) a person who presides over a jury and speaks on its behalf. <i>If you want to leave early you have to ask the foreman.</i>
fund	Place or store up in a fund for accumulation. <i>Fund a medical care plan.</i>
installment	A part of a published serial.
investment	The act of investing; laying out money or capital in an enterprise with the expectation of profit. <i>This job calls for the investment of some hard thinking.</i>
manager	Someone who controls resources and expenditures. <i>She was a good manager and could make a meal out of nothing.</i>
mortgage	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>A 60 000 mortgage.</i>
organizer	A lightweight consumer electronic device that looks like a hand-held computer but instead performs specific tasks; can serve as a diary or a personal database or a telephone or an alarm clock etc. <i>The organizers of the demonstration.</i>
<u>profession</u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After profession she taught in Maidenhead.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Every day the split between the rich and the poor widens.</i>

secretary

A desk used for writing.

*She was **secretary** to David Wilby MP.*

solicitor

A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts.

*She had been a telephone **solicitor** for a Chicago newspaper.*

storekeeper

A shopkeeper.

superintendent

(in the US) a high-ranking official, especially the chief of a police department.

*The **superintendent** registrar.*

supervise

Observe and direct the work of (someone).

*The sergeant left to **supervise** the loading of the lorries.*

treasurer

The head of the Exchequer.

underwrite

Protect by insurance.

*They were willing to **underwrite** in part the construction of a ship.*
