

another	Any of various alternatives; some other. Put it off to <b>another</b> or some other day.
<u>anyway</u>	Used to confirm or support a point or idea just mentioned. Nobody invited Miss Honey to sit down but she sat down <b>anyway</b> .
<u>besides</u>	Making an additional point; anyway. I don t want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can t afford it.



decriminalize	Make legal. A battle to <b>decriminalize</b> cannabis.
<u>devoid</u>	Completely wanting or lacking. Lisa kept her voice <b>devoid</b> of emotion.
elimination	The removal of a variable from an equation, typically by substituting another which is shown by another equation to be equivalent. <i>After the initial <b>elimination</b> rounds 16 boys qualified for the final.</i>
etcetera	Additional unspecified odds and ends; more of the same. <i>His report was full of <b>etcetera</b>s.</i>
except	Take exception to. Five classes of advertisement are <b>except</b> ed from control.
exception	A person or thing that is excluded from a general statement or does not follow a rule. With the <b>exception</b> of the children everyone was told the news.
exclude	Expel (a pupil) from school. This policy <b>exclude</b> s people who have a criminal record from entering the country.
<u>exclusion</u>	An item or eventuality specifically not covered by an insurance policy or other contract. <i>He had a hand in my <b>exclusion</b> from the committee.</i>
exemption	Immunity from an obligation or duty. Additional <b>exemption</b> s are allowed for each dependent.
expulsion	The act of expelling or projecting or ejecting. The <b>expulsion</b> of two diplomats from the embassy.
extra	Excessive or extravagant. A lot of <b>extra</b> work is involved.
<u>furthermore</u>	In addition. Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.
instead	On the contrary. Walk to work <b>instead</b> of going by car.
<u>irrelevant</u>	Not connected with or relevant to something. Theory can sometimes be hastily dismissed as <b>irrelevant</b> to the classroom.
<u>likewise</u>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. Some people have little power to do good and have <b>likewise</b> little strength to resist evil.
obviate	Avoid or prevent (something undesirable. A parachute can be used to <b>obviate</b> disaster.



<u>omit</u>	Leave out or exclude (someone or something), either intentionally or forgetfully. <i>He modestly</i> <b>omit</b> s to mention that he was a pole vault champion.
other	Not the same one or ones already mentioned or implied- the White Queen. Any <b>other</b> person would tell the truth.
<u>otherwise</u>	In a different way. The collection is a good draw that brings visitors who might not come <b>otherwise</b> .
<u>plus</u>	(before a number) above zero; positive. B <b>plus</b> .
<u>redefine</u>	Give a new or different definition to. She <b>redefine</b> d his duties.
riddance	The action of getting rid of a troublesome or unwanted person or thing. The new movement emphasized discipline not <b>riddance</b> or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.
<u>too</u>	Very. He wore suits that seemed a size <b>too</b> small for him.
unshared	Not shared with or by another or others. Most of those placed in hostels would prefer <b>unshared</b> independent accommodation.
