- *Especially of leaves; located at the base of a plant or stem; especially arising directly from the root or rootstock or a root-like stem.*

basic	(usually in the plural) a necessary commodity for which demand is constant. <i>If your date orders vegetable tempura you know she is totally basic.</i>
basilar	Of or relating to or located at the base. <i>The basilar membrane of the cochlea.</i>
capital	Uppercase. <i>The crime capital of Italy.</i>
concept	An idea or mental image which corresponds to some distinct entity or class of entities, or to its essential features, or determines the application of a term (especially a predicate), and thus plays a part in the use of reason or language. <i>Structuralism is a difficult concept.</i>
cornerstone	An important quality or feature on which a particular thing depends or is based. <i>A national minimum wage remained the cornerstone of policy.</i>
elemental	Relating to or being an element. <i>A thunderstorm is the inevitable outcome of battling elemental forces.</i>
elementary	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of elementary school or elementary education. <i>An elementary astronomy course.</i>
elements	Violent or severe weather viewed as caused by the action of the four elements. <i>They felt the full fury of the elements.</i>
essential	The fundamental elements or characteristics of something. <i>We only had the bare essentials in the way of equipment.</i>

<u>essentially</u>	Used to emphasize the basic, fundamental, or intrinsic nature of a person or thing. <i>Essentially they are amateurs.</i>
essentialness	Basic importance.
fundamental	A fundamental note tone or frequency. <i>The fundamental revolution in human values that has occurred.</i>
fundamentally	In central or primary respects. <i>Fundamentally this is a matter for doctors.</i>
<u>gist</u>	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>The gist of the prosecutor's argument.</i>
<u>indispensable</u>	Unavoidable. <i>The routine but indispensable ceremonies of state.</i>
leading	The activity of leading. <i>We rode in the leading car.</i>
<u>main</u>	A principal pipe carrying water or gas to buildings, or taking sewage from them. <i>The main problem is one of resources.</i>
pedestal	Set or support on a pedestal. <i>They put him on a pedestal.</i>
prima	Used primarily as eating apples. <i>Prima ballerina.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part; mainly. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
<u>primary</u>	A primary colour. <i>The organic matter is formed by primary producers such as plants and plankton.</i>
prime	Cover with a primer apply a primer to. <i>Our manhood's prime vigor.</i>
principal	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>He had been an outstanding principal in the orchestra.</i>
radically	In a thorough or fundamental way; completely. <i>The two situations are radically different.</i>
rudiment	The remains of a body part that was functional at an earlier stage of life. <i>The rudiments of a hot water system.</i>
<u>rudimentary</u>	Relating to an immature, undeveloped, or basic form. <i>He received a rudimentary education.</i>

staple

Attach or secure with a staple or staples.

underlying

In the nature of something though not readily apparent.

*The flu can be particularly severe for the elderly and those with **underlying** conditions.*

vital

The body's important internal organs.

*The loss of **vital** heat in shock.*
