- abuse** Improper or excessive use.
*Human rights **abuses**.*
- admonishment** A firm warning or reprimand.
*There was no need for **admonishment** or angry words.*
- admonition** A firm rebuke.
*He received numerous **admonitions** for his behaviour.*
- assault** The crime of forcing a woman to submit to sexual intercourse against her will.
*Troops began an **assault** on the city.*
- attack** The act of attacking.
*The north western suburbs came under **attack** in the latest fighting.*

| battering | A liquid or semiliquid mixture, as of flour, eggs, and milk, used in cooking. <i>The film took a battering from critics.</i> |
| berating | A severe rebuke. <i>He deserved the berating that the coach gave him.</i> |
| brickbat | A piece of brick used as a missile. <i>He had received a blow with a brickbat.</i> |
| brickbats | A fragment of brick used as a weapon. |
| broadside | The set of guns which can fire on each side of a warship. <i>The ship was broadside to the dock.</i> |
| censure | The formal expression of severe disapproval. <i>Two MPs were singled out for censure.</i> |
| condemnation | An expression of strong disapproval; pronouncing as wrong or morally culpable. <i>There was strong international condemnation of the attack.</i> |
| criticism | Disapproval expressed by pointing out faults or shortcomings. <i>He received a lot of criticism.</i> |
| denunciation | The action of informing against someone. <i>Denunciation of his reckless methods.</i> |
| diatribe | Thunderous verbal attack. <i>A diatribe against consumerism.</i> |
| flak | A slick spokesperson who can turn any criticism to the advantage of their employer. <i>He has been getting flak from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i> |
| harangue | A lengthy and aggressive speech. <i>They were subjected to a ten minute harangue by two border guards.</i> |
| invective | Abusive or venomous language used to express blame or censure or bitter deep-seated ill will. <i>He let out a stream of invective.</i> |
| lecture | A speech that is open to the public. <i>The usual lecture on table manners.</i> |
| mugging | A person who is gullible and easy to take advantage of. <i>He was the victim of a brutal mugging.</i> |
| polemic | The practice of engaging in controversial debate or dispute. <i>The history of science has become embroiled in religious polemics.</i> |

| railing | Material for making rails or rails collectively. <i>Wrought iron railings.</i> |
| <u>rant</u> | A spell of ranting a tirade. <i>His rants against organized religion.</i> |
| <u>rebuke</u> | An expression of sharp disapproval or criticism. <i>He had to take the rebuke with a smile on his face.</i> |
| reprimand | A formal expression of disapproval. <i>The golfer received a reprimand for a breach of rules.</i> |
| stream of abuse | Dominant course (suggestive of running water) of successive events or ideas. |
| stricture | Abnormal narrowing of a bodily canal or passageway. <i>A colonic stricture.</i> |
| <u>tirade</u> | A speech of violent denunciation. <i>A tirade of abuse.</i> |
| tongue-lashing | Rebuking a person harshly. |
| violence | A turbulent state resulting in injuries and destruction etc. <i>Violence erupted in protest marches.</i> |
