- *Derive or receive pleasure from; get enjoyment from; take pleasure in.*
- *Revel in and make the most of (something pleasing).*
- *Lie exposed to warmth and light, typically from the sun, for relaxation and pleasure.*

- enjoy** Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in.  
*I **enjoy** watching good films.*
- glory** Take great pride or pleasure in.  
*Readers tended to defend their paper or even to **glory** in its bias.*
- indulge oneself** Yield (to); give satisfaction to.
- laze** Spend time in a relaxed, lazy manner.  
***Laze** away a long summer day.*
- lie** (of a thing) rest flat on a surface.  
*An action for restitution would **lie** for money paid in breach of the law.*

| <b>savour</b>        | Enjoy or appreciate (something pleasant) to the full, especially by lingering over it.<br><i>Their genuflections <b>savoured</b> of superstition and popery.</i> |
| <b><u>sprawl</u></b> | Sit, lie, or fall with one's arms and legs spread out in an ungainly way.<br><i>The door shot open sending him <b>sprawling</b> across the pavement.</i>         |
| <b>take pleasure</b> | Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs.  |
| <b>wallow</b>        | (of a person) indulge in an unrestrained way in (something that one finds pleasurable).<br><i>I was <b>wallowing</b> in the luxury of the hotel.</i>             |



## Usage Examples of "Bask" as a verb

- *He went on basking in the glory of his first book.*
- *She relished her fame and basked in her glory.*
- *The seals were basking in the sun.*
- *Sprawled figures basking in the afternoon sun.*
- *The seals came ashore to breed and to bask.*



## Associations of "Bask" (30 Words)

- auroral** Of or relating to the atmospheric phenomenon auroras.  
*A dim **auroral** glow.*
- beam** Express with a beaming face or smile.  
*Notice how broad in the **beam** she s getting.*
- blaze** Indicate by marking trees with blazes.  
*The **blaze** spread rapidly.*
- bright** Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing reflecting a sheen or glow.  
*A choice of colours from pastels through to **brights**.*
- burn** Burn sear or freeze tissue using a hot iron or electric current or a caustic agent.  
*Natural gas produces the cleanest **burn** of the lot.*

| <b>illuminate</b>     | Decorate (a building or structure) with lights for a special occasion.<br><i>Placing the events of the 1930s in a broader historical context helps to <b>illuminate</b> their significance.</i> |
| <b>illumine</b>       | Enlighten (someone) spiritually or intellectually.<br><i>He moved her lamp so that her face was <b>illuminated</b>.</i>   |
| <b>light</b>          | The amount or quality of light in a place.<br><i><b>Light</b> headed from lack of sleep.</i>  |
| <b>lucent</b>         | Glowing with or giving off light.<br><i>The <b>lucent</b> moon.</i>   |
| <b>luminescence</b>   | The emission of light by a substance that has not been heated, as in fluorescence and phosphorescence.<br><i>Honey fungus produces a ghostly greenish <b>luminescence</b>.</i>                  |
| <b>luminescent</b>    | Emitting light not caused by heat.<br><i>There s something calming about watching a <b>luminescent</b> jellyfish.</i>   |
