<b><a href="#">askance</a></b>	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>A waiter looked <b>askance</b> at his jeans.</i>
<b><a href="#">behold</a></b>	See with attention. <i><b>Behold</b> Christ.</i>
<b>blinking</b>	Informal intensifiers. <i>I ll sign off however I <b>blinking</b> well like.</i>
<b>eyelid</b>	Either of two folds of skin that can be moved to cover or open the eye.
<b><a href="#">gaze</a></b>	A long fixed look. <i>He fixed his paternal <b>gaze</b> on me.</i>
<b>glance</b>	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>Fish sporting with quick <b>glance</b> Show to the Sun their wav d coats.</i>
<b>iris</b>	Of an aperture typically that of a lens open or close in the manner of an iris or iris diaphragm.
<b>leer</b>	A lascivious or unpleasant look. <i>The men <b>leered</b> at the young women on the beach.</i>
<b>look</b>	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>A committee is <b>looking</b> at the financing of the BBC.</i>
<b>macroscopic</b>	Large enough to be visible with the naked eye.
<b>observing</b>	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception.
<b>ocular</b>	Combination of lenses at the viewing end of optical instruments. <i><b>Ocular</b> trauma.</i>
<b>optic</b>	A lens or other optical component in an optical instrument. <i>An <b>optical</b> illusion.</i>
<b>optical</b>	A pair of glasses. <i>He pushed his <b>opticals</b> on to the bridge of his nose.</i>

<b><u>peek</u></b>	A quick or furtive look. <i>I only <b>peeked</b> I didn't see anything interesting.</i>
<b>perceptual</b>	Relating to the ability to interpret or become aware of something through the senses. <i>A patient with <b>perceptual</b> problems who cannot judge distances.</i>
<b><u>see</u></b>	Imagine conceive of see in one's mind. <i>We went to <b>see</b> the Eiffel Tower in the morning.</i>
<b><u>sensory</u></b>	Of a nerve fiber or impulse originating outside and passing toward the central nervous system. <i>The <b>sensory</b> cortex.</i>
<b>sidelong</b>	Situated at or extending to the side- Tennyson. <i><b>Sidelong</b> glances.</i>
<b>sight</b>	Take aim by looking through the sights of a gun. <i>Tell me when you <b>sight</b> London Bridge.</i>
<b><u>sneer</u></b>	A contemptuous or scornful remark. <i>She <b>sneered</b> her contempt.</i>
<b>spectacle</b>	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The acrobatic feats make a good <b>spectacle</b>.</i>
<b>squint</b>	The act of squinting looking with the eyes partly closed. <i>The <b>squint</b> bottom edge of the puzzle.</i>
<b><u>stare</u></b>	Fixate one's eyes. <i>The obituaries <b>stared</b> out at us.</i>
<b>telescopic</b>	Relating to or made with a telescope. <i><b>Telescopic</b> observations.</i>
<b><u>visible</u></b>	Visible imports or exports. <i>A <b>visible</b> object.</i>
<b>vision</b>	The images seen on a television screen. <i>He had a <b>vision</b> of his own death.</i>
<b><u>visual</u></b>	Relating to seeing or sight. <i><b>Visual</b> powers.</i>
<b><u>watch</u></b>	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>He told me my telephones were tapped and that I was being <b>watched</b>.</i>
<b><u>wink</u></b>	An act of winking. <i>Barney gave him a knowing <b>wink</b>.</i>
