askance	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>A waiter looked askance at his jeans.</i>
behold	See with attention. <i>Behold Christ.</i>
blinking	Informal intensifiers. <i>I ll sign off however I blinking well like.</i>
eyelid	Either of two folds of skin that can be moved to cover or open the eye.
gaze	A long fixed look. <i>He fixed his paternal gaze on me.</i>
glance	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>Fish sporting with quick glance Show to the Sun their wav d coats.</i>
iris	Of an aperture typically that of a lens open or close in the manner of an iris or iris diaphragm.
leer	A lascivious or unpleasant look. <i>The men leered at the young women on the beach.</i>
look	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>A committee is looking at the financing of the BBC.</i>
macroscopic	Large enough to be visible with the naked eye.
observing	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception.
ocular	Combination of lenses at the viewing end of optical instruments. <i>Ocular trauma.</i>
optic	A lens or other optical component in an optical instrument. <i>An optical illusion.</i>
optical	A pair of glasses. <i>He pushed his opticals on to the bridge of his nose.</i>

peek	A quick or furtive look. <i>I only peeked I didn't see anything interesting.</i>
perceptual	Relating to the ability to interpret or become aware of something through the senses. <i>A patient with perceptual problems who cannot judge distances.</i>
see	Imagine conceive of see in one's mind. <i>We went to see the Eiffel Tower in the morning.</i>
sensory	Of a nerve fiber or impulse originating outside and passing toward the central nervous system. <i>The sensory cortex.</i>
sidelong	Situated at or extending to the side- Tennyson. <i>Sidelong glances.</i>
sight	Take aim by looking through the sights of a gun. <i>Tell me when you sight London Bridge.</i>
sneer	A contemptuous or scornful remark. <i>She sneered her contempt.</i>
spectacle	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The acrobatic feats make a good spectacle.</i>
squint	The act of squinting looking with the eyes partly closed. <i>The squint bottom edge of the puzzle.</i>
stare	Fixate one's eyes. <i>The obituaries stared out at us.</i>
telescopic	Relating to or made with a telescope. <i>Telescopic observations.</i>
visible	Visible imports or exports. <i>A visible object.</i>
vision	The images seen on a television screen. <i>He had a vision of his own death.</i>
visual	Relating to seeing or sight. <i>Visual powers.</i>
watch	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>He told me my telephones were tapped and that I was being watched.</i>
wink	An act of winking. <i>Barney gave him a knowing wink.</i>
