- paddle** A blade of a paddle wheel or water wheel.  
***Paddle** strokes.*
- plunge** An act of jumping or diving into water.  
*The central bank declared a 76 **plunge** in its profits.*
- swim** An act or period of swimming.  
*We went for a **swim** in the river.*

### Definitions of "Bathe" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "bathe" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Swim or spend time in the sea or a lake, river, or pool for pleasure.*
- *Wash (someone) in a bath.*
- *Wash by immersing one's body in water.*
- *Suffuse or envelope with something.*
- *Soak or wipe gently with liquid to clean or soothe.*
- *Swim for pleasure or recreation.*
- *Suffuse or envelop in something.*
- *Cleanse the entire body.*
- *Clean one's body by immersion into water.*

- *Suffuse with or as if with light.*

<b>clean</b>	Clean and tidy up the house. <i>She house<b>cleans</b> every week.</i>
<b>cleanse</b>	(in biblical translations) cure (a leper). <i>Only God Himself can <b>cleanse</b> us.</i>
<b>colour</b>	Take on a different colour. <i>He <b>coloured</b> her hair with a selection of blonde and brown shades.</i>
<b>cover</b>	Form a cover over. <i>Channel 4 are <b>covering</b> the match.</i>
<b>dip</b>	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>The sun <b>dipped</b> below the horizon.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>A figure <b>enveloped</b> in a black cloak.</i>
<b>fill</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>Road engineers planned to <b>fill</b> the hole with concrete.</i>
<b>give ... a bath</b>	Be flexible under stress of physical force.
<b>go swimming</b>	Be ranked or compare.
<b>have a bath</b>	Undergo.
<b>imbue</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>

<b>impregnate</b>	Infuse or fill completely. <i>The egg was <b>impregnated</b>.</i>
<b>inform</b>	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>Religion <b>informs</b> every aspect of their lives.</i>
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>I just went down to the store and <b>loaded</b> up on beer.</i>
<b>moisten</b>	Moisten with fine drops. <i>The dew <b>moistened</b> the meadows.</i>
<b><u>permeate</u></b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The aroma of soup <b>permeated</b> the air.</i>
<b><u>pervade</u></b>	(especially of a smell) spread through and be perceived in every part of. <i>The sense of crisis which <b>pervaded</b> Europe in the 1930s.</i>
<b>rinse</b>	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>Karen <b>rinsed</b> her mouth out.</i>
<b><u>saturate</u></b>	Cause (something) to become thoroughly soaked with water or other liquid so that no more can be absorbed. <i>Japan's electronics industry began to <b>saturate</b> the world markets.</i>
<b>shower</b>	Of a mass of small things fall or be thrown in a shower. <i>Hooligans <b>showered</b> him with rotten eggs.</i>
<b><u>soak</u></b>	Fill, soak or imbue totally. <i>The sweat <b>soaked</b> through his clothes.</i>
<b>soap</b>	Rub soap all over usually with the purpose of cleaning. <i>She <b>soaped</b> her face.</i>
<b>splash around</b>	Walk through mud or mire.
<b><u>steep</u></b>	Devote (oneself) fully to. <i><b>Steep</b> the blossoms in oil.</i>
<b>suffuse</b>	Gradually spread through or over. <i>The sky was <b>suffused</b> with a warm pink color.</i>
<b><u>swim</u></b>	Cross a particular stretch of water by swimming. <i>The meat was <b>swimming</b> in a fatty gravy.</i>
<b>take a bath</b>	Point or cause to go (blows, weapons, or objects such as photographic equipment) towards.
<b>take a dip</b>	Require (time or space).
<b><u>wash</u></b>	Wash or flow against. <i>The swollen river <b>washed</b> away the footbridge.</i>

**wet**

Make one's bed or clothes wet by urinating.  
*She was going to **wet** herself from fear.*

- *She was advised to bathe or shower daily.*

- *They bathed the baby.*
- *The park lay bathed in sunshine.*





## Associations of "Bathe" (30 Words)

<b>ablution</b>	(in army slang) a building or room containing washing facilities and toilets. <i>The women performed their <b>ablutions</b>.</i>
<b>bath</b>	Wash someone while immersing them in a bath. <i>The bedrooms have their own <b>bath</b> and shower.</i>
<b>bathtub</b>	A bath.
<b>bleach</b>	Clean or sterilize a drain sink etc with bleach. <i>A complete <b>bleach</b> usually requires several applications.</i>
<b>brainwash</b>	Submit to brainwashing indoctrinate forcibly. <i>The propaganda <b>brainwashed</b> many people.</i>
<b>bubble</b>	Form produce or emit bubbles. <i>They are not on tour packages seeing foreign ports from a <b>bubble</b>.</i>
<b>clean</b>	Clean one's body or parts thereof as by washing. <i>You have to eat <b>clean</b> foods to change your physique.</i>
<b>cleaner</b>	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>She's one of the office <b>cleaners</b>.</i>
<b>cleanly</b>	Without difficulty or impediment; smoothly and efficiently. <i>The engine burns very <b>cleanly</b>.</i>
<b>cleanse</b>	Clean one's body or parts thereof, as by washing. <i>I recommend doing a <b>cleanse</b> when your social calendar is event free because you might feel a bit more tired than usual.</i>
<b>dampen</b>	Check; keep in check (a fire). <i>Nothing could <b>dampen</b> her enthusiasm.</i>
<b>deaden</b>	Deprive of the power of sensation. <i><b>Deaden</b> a sound.</i>
<b>detergent</b>	Relating to detergents or their action. <i>Staining that resists <b>detergent</b> action.</i>
<b>detoxify</b>	Remove poison from. <i>You can help your body <b>detoxify</b> by cutting down on coffee.</i>
<b>lather</b>	Form a lather. <i>Dad had got into a right <b>lather</b> by the time I got home.</i>
<b>launder</b>	Conceal the origins of (money obtained illegally), typically by transfers involving foreign banks or legitimate businesses. <i>He wasn't used to <b>laundering</b> his own bed linen.</i>
<b>laundress</b>	A woman who is employed to launder clothes and linen.

<b>laundry</b>	Clothes and linen that need to be washed or that have been newly washed. <i>I spent most of my weekend doing <b>laundry</b>.</i>
<b>lave</b>	Cleanse (one's body) with soap and water. <i>The waves <b>laved</b> the shore.</i>
<b>med</b>	Medical. <i>She s at <b>med</b> school.</i>
<b>moisten</b>	Moisten with fine drops. <i>She <b>moistened</b> her lips with the tip of her tongue.</i>
<b>rinse</b>	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>The conditioning mousse doesn't have to be <b>rinsed</b> out.</i>
<b>sanctify</b>	Cause to be or seem morally right or acceptable. <i>A small shrine was built to <b>sanctify</b> the site.</i>
<b>sanitation</b>	The state of being clean and conducive to health. <i>They could afford to erect new dwellings with a reasonable standard of construction and <b>sanitation</b>.</i>
<b>scrub</b>	An act of scrubbing something or someone. <i>Surgeons must <b>scrub</b> prior to an operation.</i>
<b>shampoo</b>	Wash or clean something especially the hair with shampoo. <i>Apply oil to wet hair otherwise it will be difficult to <b>shampoo</b> it out.</i>
<b>shower</b>	Cause a mass of small things to fall in a shower. <i>A <b>shower</b> of awards.</i>
<b>soap</b>	Rub soap all over usually with the purpose of cleaning. <i>The <b>soaps</b> are top of the ratings.</i>
<b>wash</b>	A watercolor made by applying a series of monochrome washes one over the other. <i>Copper <b>washed</b> with silver.</i>
<b>washing</b>	The action of washing oneself or laundering clothes bed linen etc. <i>Her arms were red to the elbow from doing other people's <b>washing</b>.</i>
