<b>amphibious</b>	Operating or living on land and in water. <i><b>Amphibious</b> vehicles.</i>
<b>antagonist</b>	A person who actively opposes or is hostile to someone or something; an adversary. <i>When bending the elbow the triceps are the <b>antagonist</b>.</i>
<b>battlefield</b>	The piece of ground on which a battle is or was fought. <i>The <b>battlefields</b> of the Great War.</i>
<b>belligerent</b>	Engaged in war. <i>Ships and goods captured at sea by a <b>belligerent</b>.</i>
<b>challenger</b>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>The leading team among the nine <b>challengers</b>.</i>
<b>clash</b>	Be incompatible or at odds. <i>These colors <b>clash</b>.</i>
<a href="#">compete</a>	Compete for something engage in a contest measure oneself against others. <i>He <b>competed</b> in numerous track meets as a child.</i>
<b>competitor</b>	A person who takes part in a sporting contest. <i>Two <b>competitors</b> were banned for taking drugs.</i>
<a href="#">contend</a>	Maintain or assert. <i>She had to <b>contend</b> with his uncertain temper.</i>
<a href="#">contender</a>	A person or group competing with others to achieve something. <i>A presidential <b>contender</b>.</i>
<a href="#">counterpart</a>	A duplicate copy. <i>The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b>.</i>
<b>crossfire</b>	A lively or heated interchange of ideas and opinions. <i>A photographer was killed in <b>crossfire</b>.</i>

<b><u>dissident</u></b>	A person who opposes official policy, especially that of an authoritarian state. <i>The measure was supported by <b>dissident</b> Tories.</i>
<b>encounter</b>	Meet (someone) unexpectedly. <i>He was shot dead in a police <b>encounter</b>.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i>The <b>enemy</b> shot down four helicopters.</i>
<b>fight</b>	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>The men were <b>fighting</b>.</i>
<b><u>hostile</u></b>	Unsolicited and resisted by the management of the target company (used of attempts to buy or take control of a business). <i>A <b>hostile</b> nation.</i>
<b>invasion</b>	An incursion by a large number of people or things into a place or sphere of activity. <i>An <b>invasion</b> of locusts.</i>
<b>irreconcilable</b>	Incapable of being resolved. <i>These two views of the economy are <b>irreconcilable</b>.</i>
<b><u>militant</u></b>	A militant person. <i><b>Militants</b> became increasingly impatient of parliamentary manoeuvres.</i>
<b><u>nemesis</u></b>	(Greek mythology) the goddess of divine retribution and vengeance. <i>Will Harry Potter finally defeat his <b>nemesis</b> Voldemort.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	A contestant that you are matched against. <i>He beat his <b>opponent</b> by a landslide margin.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Compete with (someone). <i>The board <b>opposed</b> his motion.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	Characterized by active hostility. <i>On the <b>opposing</b> page there were two addresses.</i>
<b><u>overtake</u></b>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>Disaster <b>overtook</b> the town in 1296.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>He had respect for his <b>rivals</b>.</i>
<b><u>unbeatable</u></b>	Incapable of being overcome or subdued. <i>The team is <b>unbeatable</b>.</i>
<b>unseat</b>	Remove (a government or person in authority) from power. <i>Rawhide <b>unseated</b> Kevin Bradley at the first fence.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were <b>vying</b> for a place in the British team.</i>
