# Synonyms of "Battle" as a noun (13 Words)

affray	Noisy quarrel. Lowe was charged with causing an <b>affray</b> .
clash	An incompatibility leading to disagreement. There have been minor <b>clash</b> es with security forces.
competition	The activity or condition of striving to gain or win something by defeating or establishing superiority over others. <i>A beauty competition</i> .
conflict	A state of opposition between persons or ideas or interests. Bewildered by her own inner <b>conflict</b> she could only stand there feeling vulnerable.
<u>confrontation</u>	A hostile disagreement face-to-face. Four months of violent <b>confrontation</b> between government and opposition forces.



<u>contest</u>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. A <b>contest</b> between traditional and liberal views.
dogfight	A close combat between military aircraft. Their rancor dated from a political <b>dogfight</b> between them.
encounter	A casual or unexpected convergence. <i>He was shot dead in a police <b>encounter</b>.</i>
engagement	The duration of an agreement to get married. <i>He lost his romantic ideas about war when he got into a real</i> <b>engagement</b> .
fight	The act of fighting any contest or struggle. <i>The team was full of <b>fight</b>.</i>
<u>fray</u>	A noisy fight.
skirmish	A minor short-term fight. There was a <b>skirmish</b> over the budget.
struggle	A forceful or violent effort to get free of restraint or resist attack. The centre is the result of the scientists <b>struggle</b> to realize their dream.

<u>combat</u>	Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle. We must <b>combat</b> the prejudices against other races.
contend with Maintain or assert.	
fight	Fight against or resist strongly. Siblings are always <b>fight</b> ing.
labour	Of a woman in childbirth be in labour. United <b>labour</b> ed against confident opponents.



scramble	Order (a fighter aircraft or its pilot) to take off immediately in an emergency or for action. As the jet headed towards Italian airspace two F104 fighters <b>scramble</b> d from a base in Sicily to intercept it.
struggle	To exert strenuous effort against opposition. Passengers <b>struggle</b> with bags and briefcases.

- He has been battling against the illness.
- Firefighters battled a 9,800-acre brush fire.
- They battled over the budget.





# Associations of "Battle" (30 Words)

amphibious	Relating to, living in, or suited for both land and water. An <b>amphibious</b> assault.
antagonist	A substance which interferes with or inhibits the physiological action of another. LSD is a serotonin <b>antagonist</b> .
battlefield	The piece of ground on which a battle is or was fought. An ideological <b>battlefield</b> .
belligerent	Someone who fights (or is fighting. A conference of socialists from all <b>belligerent</b> countries.
challenger	A person who makes a rival claim to or threatens someone's hold on a position. <i>Heroic <b>challenger</b>s of authority.</i>



clash	(of colours) appear discordant or ugly when placed close to each other. We play our home games when they do not <b>clash</b> with those of Liverpool or Everton.
<u>compete</u>	Compete for something engage in a contest measure oneself against others. <i>He</i> <b>compete</b> <i>d in numerous track meets as a child</i> .
competitor	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>Our main industrial <b>competitor</b>s.</i>
<u>contend</u>	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>He contends that the judge was wrong.</i>
<u>contender</u>	The contestant you hope to defeat. A presidential <b>contender</b> .
<u>counterpart</u>	One of two copies of a legal document. The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b> .
crossfire	A lively or heated interchange of ideas and opinions. The sponsors are caught in the <b>crossfire</b> of the battle between the world champion and his team boss.
<u>dissident</u>	Characterized by departure from accepted beliefs or standards. A <b>dissident</b> who had been jailed by a military regime.
encounter	An unexpected or casual meeting with someone or something. What do we know about the people we <b>encounter</b> in our daily lives.
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. This man was her sworn <b>enemy</b> .
fight	Fight against or resist strongly. General Hill <b>fight</b> s his troops well.
<u>hostile</u>	Unsolicited and resisted by the management of the target company (used of attempts to buy or take control of a business. <i>The brewery fought off a hostile takeover bid last year.</i>
invasion	(pathology) the spread of pathogenic microorganisms or malignant cells to new sites in the body. <i>There was a brief pitch invasion when Sunderland scored.</i>
irreconcilable	Incapable of being resolved. These two views of the economy are <b>irreconcilable</b> .
<u>militant</u>	A militant reformer. <b>Militant</b> s became increasingly impatient of parliamentary manoeuvres.
<u>nemesis</u>	(Greek mythology) the goddess of divine retribution and vengeance. Injury consistently his <b>nemesis</b> struck him down during the match.



opponent	Characterized by active hostility. Against superior <b>opponent</b> s they fell two goals behind.
oppose	Actively resist (a person or system. The board <b>oppose</b> d his motion.
opposing	Characterized by active hostility. The brothers fought on <b>opposing</b> sides in the war.
<u>overtake</u>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. Weariness overtook him and he retired to bed.
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. She has no <b>rival</b> s as a female rock singer.
<u>unbeatable</u>	Hard to defeat. <i>Views from the patio are <b>unbeatable</b>.</i>
unseat	Remove from political office. Rawhide <b>unseat</b> ed Kevin Bradley at the first fence.
vie	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.
<u>warfare</u>	The waging of armed conflict against an enemy. Diplomatic <b>warfare</b> .
