finger	A part of a glove intended to cover a finger. <i>Two fingers of brandy.</i>
girder	A large iron or steel beam or compound structure used for building bridges and the framework of large buildings. <i>The tower is made of steel girders criss crossed to make it stronger.</i>
girth	A person's waist or stomach, especially when large. <i>Idle men of great girth.</i>
grin	A broad smile. <i>A silly grin.</i>
irradiation	The apparent enlargement of a bright object when viewed against a dark background. <i>Ultraviolet irradiation.</i>
joist	Beam used to support floors or roofs.
lath	Laths collectively as a building material. <i>A lath and plaster wall.</i>
light beam	Mental understanding as an enlightening experience.
lintel	A horizontal support of timber, stone, concrete, or steel across the top of a door or window.
pencil	Something with the shape of a pencil. <i>A pencil torch.</i>
plank	A stupid person. <i>The session usually include a lot of core work lunges planks and squats.</i>
purlin	A horizontal beam along the length of a roof, resting on principals and supporting the common rafters or boards.
radio beam	An electronic receiver that detects and demodulates and amplifies transmitted signals.
rafter	One of several parallel sloping beams that support a roof. <i>A vaulted hall with exposed rafters.</i>
ray	Each of the lines in which light (and heat) may seem to stream from the sun or any luminous body, or pass through a small opening. <i>A ray of sunlight came through the window.</i>
ray of light	Any of the stiff bony spines in the fin of a fish.

scantling	A specimen, sample, or small amount of something.
shaft	A long vertical passage sunk into the earth, as for a mine or tunnel. <i>He directs his shafts against her.</i>
shaft of light	A column of light (as from a beacon).
signal	A prearranged convention of bidding or play intended to convey information to one's partner. <i>He awaited the signal to start.</i>
signal fire	Any incitement to action.
signal light	Any nonverbal action or gesture that encodes a message.
smile	A facial expression characterized by turning up the corners of the mouth; usually shows pleasure or amusement. <i>She greeted us all with a smile.</i>
smoke signal	A pitch thrown with maximum velocity.
<u>span</u>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>The job was finished in the span of an hour.</i>
spar	Any of various nonmetallic minerals calcite or feldspar that are light in color and transparent or translucent and cleavable.
spread	A bedspread. <i>The male s antlers can attain a spread of six feet.</i>
stay	A period of staying somewhere in particular of living somewhere temporarily as a visitor or guest. <i>A lengthy hospital stay.</i>
<u>streak</u>	An element of a specified kind in someone's character. <i>There s a streak of insanity in the family.</i>
<u>stream</u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>The hose ejected a stream of water.</i>
stringer	A longitudinal structural piece in a framework, especially that of a ship or aircraft. <i>A second stringer.</i>
strut	A stiff, erect, and apparently arrogant or conceited gait. <i>A supporting strut.</i>

irradiate	Expose (someone or something) to radiation. <i>Irradiate food.</i>
light	Having a considerable or sufficient amount of natural light not dark. <i>They saw the light of the beacon.</i>
lighten	Make more cheerful. <i>Try to lighten up and think positive.</i>
lucent	Softly bright or radiant. <i>The moon was lucent in the background.</i>

phosphorescent	Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous. <i>The phosphorescent glow of decaying wood.</i>
radiant	A radiant point. <i>I sat down by my hissing gas fire one of the radiants was missing.</i>
radiation	Syndrome resulting from exposure to ionizing radiation e.g. exposure to radioactive chemicals or to nuclear explosions low doses cause diarrhea and nausea and vomiting and sometimes loss of hair greater exposure can cause sterility and cataracts and some forms of cancer and other diseases severe exposure can cause death within hours. <i>The radiation dose.</i>
