### Synonyms of "Bearable" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>endurable</b>	Able to be endured; bearable. <i>My journey was long but <b>endurable</b>.</i>
<b>sufferable</b>	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i><b>Sufferable</b> punishment.</i>
<b>supportable</b>	Capable of being borne though unpleasant.
<b>sustainable</b>	Conserving an ecological balance by avoiding depletion of natural resources. <i><b>Sustainable</b> economic growth.</i>
<b>tolerable</b>	Able to be endured. <i>He was fond of music and had a <b>tolerable</b> voice.</i>

## Associations of "Bearable" (30 Words)

<b>acceptance</b>	Banking: a time draft drawn on and accepted by a bank. <i><b>Acceptance</b> of Newtonian mechanics was unquestioned for 200 years.</i>
<b>adequate</b>	Satisfactory or acceptable in quality or quantity. <i>An <b>adequate</b> income.</i>
<b><u>anemic</u></b>	Relating to anemia or suffering from anemia. <i>An <b>anemic</b> attempt to hit the baseball.</i>
<b>asthmatic</b>	A person suffering from asthma. <i>She is a chronic <b>asthmatic</b>.</i>
<b><u>bear</u></b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>She agreed to <b>bear</b> the responsibility.</i>
<b><u>bedridden</u></b>	Confined to bed by sickness or old age.
<b>cancer</b>	A disease caused by an uncontrolled division of abnormal cells in a part of the body. <i>He s got <b>cancer</b>.</i>
<b>convalesce</b>	Get over an illness or shock. <i>He spent eight months <b>convalescing</b> after the stroke.</i>
<b>dialysis</b>	The clinical purification of blood by dialysis as a substitute for the normal function of the kidney.
<b>endurable</b>	Able to be endured; bearable. <i>My journey was long but <b>endurable</b>.</i>
<b><u>endure</u></b>	Remain in existence; last. <i>It seemed impossible that anyone could <b>endure</b> such pain.</i>
<b>forbearance</b>	A delay in enforcing rights or claims or privileges; refraining from acting. <i>His <b>forbearance</b> to reply was alarming.</i>
<b>hypochondriac</b>	Suffering from hypochondria.
<b><u>leniency</u></b>	Lightening a penalty or excusing from a chore by judges or parents or teachers. <i>The court could show <b>leniency</b>.</i>
<b>medicate</b>	Treat medicinally, treat with medicine. <i>Both infants were heavily <b>medicated</b> to alleviate their seizures.</i>

<b>passable</b>	Able to be passed or traversed or crossed. <i>He spoke <b>passable</b> English.</i>
<b>patience</b>	A card game played by one person. <i>You can find bargains if you have the <b>patience</b> to sift through the rubbish.</i>
<b>patient</b>	The semantic role of an entity that is not the agent but is directly involved in or affected by the happening denoted by the verb in the clause. <i>A <b>patient</b> and painstaking approach.</i>
<b>penicillin</b>	A blue mould of a type that produces penicillin. <i>Patients who are allergic to <b>penicillin</b>.</i>
<b>permissible</b>	Permitted; allowed. <i>A <b>permissible</b> tax deduction.</i>
<u><b>persevering</b></u>	Quietly and steadily persevering especially in detail or exactness. <i>With <b>persevering</b> or patient industry she revived the failing business.</i>
<b>sanatorium</b>	An establishment for the medical treatment of people who are convalescing or have a chronic illness.
<u><b>satisfactory</b></u>	(of evidence or a verdict) sufficient for the needs of the case. <i>The step makes a <b>satisfactory</b> seat.</i>
<b>stand</b>	Be standing be upright. <i>His traditionalist <b>stand</b>.</i>
<b>sufferance</b>	The condition of the holder of an estate who continues to hold it after the title has ceased, without the express permission of the owner. <i>Charles was only here on <b>sufferance</b>.</i>
<u><b>tolerable</b></u>	About average; acceptable. <i>He was fond of music and had a <b>tolerable</b> voice.</i>
<u><b>tolerant</b></u>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i><b>Tolerant</b> of his opponent's opinions.</i>
<u><b>tolerate</b></u>	Have a tolerance for a poison or strong drug or pathogen or environmental condition. <i>We must <b>tolerate</b> the religions of others.</i>
<b>toleration</b>	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>The king demanded greater religious <b>toleration</b>.</i>
<u><b>undergo</b></u>	Pass through. <i>The fluid <b>undergoes</b> shear.</i>
