Definitions of "Bearable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bearable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Able to be endured.*
- *Capable of being borne though unpleasant.*

Synonyms of "Bearable" as an adjective (5 Words)

endurable	Able to be endured; bearable. <i>My journey was long but endurable.</i>
sufferable	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i>Sufferable punishment.</i>
supportable	Capable of being borne though unpleasant.
sustainable	Conserving an ecological balance by avoiding depletion of natural resources. <i>Sustainable economic growth.</i>
tolerable	Able to be endured. <i>He was fond of music and had a tolerable voice.</i>

Associations of "Bearable" (30 Words)

acceptance	Banking: a time draft drawn on and accepted by a bank. <i>Acceptance of Newtonian mechanics was unquestioned for 200 years.</i>
adequate	Satisfactory or acceptable in quality or quantity. <i>An adequate income.</i>
<u>anemic</u>	Relating to anemia or suffering from anemia. <i>An anemic attempt to hit the baseball.</i>
asthmatic	A person suffering from asthma. <i>She is a chronic asthmatic.</i>
<u>bear</u>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i>She agreed to bear the responsibility.</i>
<u>bedridden</u>	Confined to bed by sickness or old age.
cancer	A disease caused by an uncontrolled division of abnormal cells in a part of the body. <i>He s got cancer.</i>
convalesce	Get over an illness or shock. <i>He spent eight months convalescing after the stroke.</i>
dialysis	The clinical purification of blood by dialysis as a substitute for the normal function of the kidney.
endurable	Able to be endured; bearable. <i>My journey was long but endurable.</i>
<u>endure</u>	Remain in existence; last. <i>It seemed impossible that anyone could endure such pain.</i>
forbearance	A delay in enforcing rights or claims or privileges; refraining from acting. <i>His forbearance to reply was alarming.</i>
hypochondriac	Suffering from hypochondria.
<u>leniency</u>	Lightening a penalty or excusing from a chore by judges or parents or teachers. <i>The court could show leniency.</i>
medicate	Treat medicinally, treat with medicine. <i>Both infants were heavily medicated to alleviate their seizures.</i>

passable	Able to be passed or traversed or crossed. <i>He spoke passable English.</i>
patience	A card game played by one person. <i>You can find bargains if you have the patience to sift through the rubbish.</i>
patient	The semantic role of an entity that is not the agent but is directly involved in or affected by the happening denoted by the verb in the clause. <i>A patient and painstaking approach.</i>
penicillin	A blue mould of a type that produces penicillin. <i>Patients who are allergic to penicillin.</i>
permissible	Permitted; allowed. <i>A permissible tax deduction.</i>
<u>persevering</u>	Quietly and steadily persevering especially in detail or exactness. <i>With persevering or patient industry she revived the failing business.</i>
sanatorium	An establishment for the medical treatment of people who are convalescing or have a chronic illness.
<u>satisfactory</u>	(of evidence or a verdict) sufficient for the needs of the case. <i>The step makes a satisfactory seat.</i>
stand	Be standing be upright. <i>His traditionalist stand.</i>
sufferance	The condition of the holder of an estate who continues to hold it after the title has ceased, without the express permission of the owner. <i>Charles was only here on sufferance.</i>
<u>tolerable</u>	About average; acceptable. <i>He was fond of music and had a tolerable voice.</i>
<u>tolerant</u>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>Tolerant of his opponent's opinions.</i>
<u>tolerate</u>	Have a tolerance for a poison or strong drug or pathogen or environmental condition. <i>We must tolerate the religions of others.</i>
toleration	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>The king demanded greater religious toleration.</i>
<u>undergo</u>	Pass through. <i>The fluid undergoes shear.</i>
