<b>aspect</b>	The positioning of a building or other structure in a particular direction. <i>Personal effectiveness in all <b>aspects</b> of life.</i>
<b>attitude</b>	Position of aircraft or spacecraft relative to a frame of reference (the horizon or direction of motion). <i>I asked the waiter for a clean fork and all I got was <b>attitude</b>.</i>
<b>badge</b>	A distinguishing object or emblem. <i>Wearing a tie was regarded as a <b>badge</b> of respectability.</i>
<b>behaviour</b>	(behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people. <i>The erratic <b>behaviour</b> of the old car.</i>
<b>carriage</b>	A railcar where passengers ride. <i>A typewriter <b>carriage</b>.</i>
<b><u>cast</u></b>	A mould used to make an object by casting. <i>The colours he wore emphasized the olive <b>cast</b> of his skin.</i>
<b><u>charge</u></b>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>I get a real <b>charge</b> out of working hard.</i>
<b>coat of arms</b>	Growth of hair or wool or fur covering the body of an animal.
<b>comportment</b>	Behaviour; bearing. <i>He displayed precisely the <b>comportment</b> expected of the rightful king.</i>

<b>connection</b>	The process of bringing ideas or events together in memory or imagination. <i>The primitive Methodists broke with the Wesleyan <b>connection</b> in 1810.</i>
<b>countenance</b>	Formal and explicit approval. <i>A pleasant <b>countenance</b>.</i>
<b>course</b>	A layer of masonry. <i>A <b>course</b> of bricks.</i>
<b>demeanour</b>	(behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people. <i>His happy <b>demeanour</b>.</i>
<b>device</b>	Any clever maneuver. <i>He was recognized by the <b>device</b> on his shield.</i>
<b>direction</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>Any dialogue between them is a step in the right <b>direction</b>.</i>
<b>emblem</b>	A thing serving as a symbol of a particular quality or concept. <i>Our child would be a dazzling <b>emblem</b> of our love.</i>
<b>endurance</b>	The capacity of something to last or to withstand wear and tear. <i>She was close to the limit of her <b>endurance</b>.</i>
<b>ensign</b>	An emblem flown as a symbol of nationality. <i>All the <b>ensigns</b> of our greatness.</i>
<b>escutcheon</b>	A flat protective covering (on a door or wall etc) to prevent soiling by dirty fingers.
<b>feel</b>	Feelings of heightened emotion. <i>I cry at everything even the types of movies you wouldn't expect to give you all the <b>feels</b>.</i>
<b>gait</b>	A horse's manner of moving. <i>The easy <b>gait</b> of an athlete.</i>
<b>germaneness</b>	Pertinence by virtue of a close relation to the matter at hand.
<b>guise</b>	An external form, appearance, or manner of presentation, typically concealing the true nature of something. <i>Under the <b>guise</b> of friendship he betrayed them.</i>
<b>heading</b>	A strip of cloth at the top of a curtain above the hooks or wire by which it is suspended. <i>This topic falls under four main <b>headings</b>.</i>
<b>import</b>	Having important effects or influence. <i>Cheap <b>imports</b> from eastern Europe.</i>

<b>importance</b>	A prominent status. <i>The <b>importance</b> of a well balanced diet.</i>
<b>insignia</b>	A distinguishing badge or emblem of military rank, office, or membership of an organization. <i>The ruins are devoid of moss and ivy the romantic <b>insignia</b> of age and decay.</i>
<b>line</b>	A contour or outline considered as a feature of design or composition. <i>In <b>line</b> with.</i>
<b>look</b>	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>He had charm good <b>looks</b> and an amusing insouciance.</i>
<b>manageability</b>	Capable of being managed or controlled.
<b>manner</b>	A semantic category of adverbs and adverbials which answer the question 'how'. <i>Didn't your mother teach you any <b>manners</b>.</i>
<b>mien</b>	A person's appearance or manner, especially as an indication of their character or mood. <i>He has a cautious academic <b>mien</b>.</i>
<b>orientation</b>	The faculty by which birds and other animals find their way back to a place after going or being taken to a place distant from it. <i>Studies of locational awareness and <b>orientation</b> in young children.</i>
<b>path</b>	A way or track laid down for walking or made by continual treading. <i>A chosen career <b>path</b>.</i>
<b>pertinence</b>	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
<b><u>posture</u></b>	A particular pose adopted by a bird or other animal, interpreted as a signal of a specific pattern of behaviour. <i>He took ballet lessons to improve his <b>posture</b>.</i>
<b><u>presence</u></b>	The state or fact of existing, occurring, or being present. <i>She blushed in his <b>presence</b>.</i>
<b>regalia</b>	Paraphernalia indicative of royalty (or other high office). <i>The Bishop of Florence in full <b>regalia</b>.</i>
<b>relation</b>	(usually plural) mutual dealings or connections among persons or groups. <i>They can take vows of chastity and give up sexual <b>relations</b> entirely.</i>
<b><u>relevance</u></b>	The relation of something to the matter at hand. <i>This film has contemporary <b>relevance</b>.</i>
<b>relevancy</b>	The relation of something to the matter at hand.

<b>run</b>	A running pace. <i>Varnish should be applied with care to avoid <b>runs</b> and an uneven surface.</i>
<b>sense of direction</b>	The faculty through which the external world is apprehended.
<b>shield</b>	A sporting trophy shaped like a shield consisting of an engraved metal plate mounted on a piece of wood. <i>Team captain Ben Hall collected the winners <b>shield</b>.</i>
<b>significance</b>	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>Do not underestimate the <b>significance</b> of nuclear power.</i>
<b>stance</b>	A site on a street for a market, street vendor's stall, or taxi rank. <i>She altered her <b>stance</b> resting all her weight on one leg.</i>
<b>style</b>	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>His shoes were in a <b>style</b> that he could wear anywhere.</i>
<b>sufferance</b>	The condition of the holder of an estate who continues to hold it after the title has ceased, without the express permission of the owner. <i>Charles was only here on <b>sufferance</b>.</i>
<b>tack</b>	A distance sailed between tacks. <i>The brig bowled past on the opposite <b>tack</b>.</i>
<b>tolerance</b>	A permissible difference; allowing some freedom to move within limits. <i>An advocate of religious <b>tolerance</b>.</i>
<b>trajectory</b>	The path followed by an object moving through space. <i>The missile's <b>trajectory</b> was preset.</i>

<b>apt</b>	At risk of or subject to experiencing something usually unpleasant. <i>He is <b>apt</b> to ignore matters he considers unimportant.</i>
<b>attitude</b>	A position in which one leg is lifted behind with the knee bent at right angles and turned out, and the corresponding arm is raised above the head, the other extended to the side. <i>The boy was standing in an <b>attitude</b> of despair.</i>
<b>befitting</b>	Appropriate to the occasion. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a <b>befitting</b> manner.</i>
<b>behaviour</b>	(psychology) the aggregate of the responses or reactions or movements made by an organism in any situation. <i>Management is a set of techniques and <b>behaviours</b> for getting things done.</i>
<b>conduct</b>	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>A code of <b>conduct</b> for directors of listed companies.</i>
<b>conformance</b>	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i><b>Conformance</b> testing.</i>
<b>congruous</b>	Corresponding in character or kind. <i>This explanation is <b>congruous</b> with earlier observations.</i>
<b>connection</b>	A relation between things or events (as in the case of one causing the other or sharing features with it). <i>She replaced the receiver before the <b>connection</b> was made.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Socially right or correct. <i><b>Correct</b> the alignment of the front wheels.</i>
<b>corrective</b>	Designed to correct or counteract something harmful or undesirable. <i><b>Corrective</b> measures.</i>
<b>demeanor</b>	(behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people.
<b>fitting</b>	The action of fitting something. <i>It was <b>fitting</b> that his last innings for Middlesex should bring him his highest first class score.</i>
<b>germane</b>	Relevant and appropriate. <i>He asks questions that are <b>germane</b> and central to the issue.</i>
<b>just</b>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>I only <b>just</b> caught the bus.</i>
<b>opportune</b>	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>The <b>opportune</b> use of humour to lower tension.</i>
<b>pertinence</b>	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
<b>pertinent</b>	Relevant or applicable to a particular matter; apposite. <i>She asked me a lot of very <b>pertinent</b> questions.</i>

- presence** A person or thing that exists or is present in a place but is not seen.  
*He sensed the **presence** of danger.*
- proper** Used as an intensifier, especially in derogatory contexts.  
*She s never had a **proper** job.*
- relate** Make or show a connection between.  
*He was **related** to my mother.*
- relevance** The quality or state of being closely connected or appropriate.  
*The quantity quality and **relevance** of links count towards your rating.*
- relevancy** The relation of something to the matter at hand.
- relevant** Having a bearing on or connection with the subject at issue.  
*Her films are **relevant** for feminists today.*
- suitable** Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse.  
*These toys are not **suitable** for children under five.*
- tapered** Becoming gradually narrower.
