## Associations of "Beat up" (30 Words)

<b>ascend</b>	(of a voice or sound) rise in pitch. <i>She <b>ascended</b> to the throne after the King's death.</i>
<b>ascending</b>	Increasing in size or importance. <i>The <b>ascending</b> staircase.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	An instance of rising or moving up through the air. <i>The first balloon <b>ascent</b> was in 1783.</i>
<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>A <b>boost</b> in exports.</i>
<b><u>climb</u></b>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>Howard started to <b>climb</b> out of the front seat.</i>
<b><u>climbing</u></b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was <b>climbing</b> especially in the Alps.</i>
<b><u>elevate</u></b>	Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position. <i>She ordered the bishop celebrating Mass in her chapel not to <b>elevate</b> the Host.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	A machine consisting of an endless belt with scoops attached, used for raising grain to an upper storey for storage. <i><b>Elevators</b> of the upper lip.</i>
<b>escalator</b>	A clause in a contract that provides for an increase or a decrease in wages or prices or benefits etc. depending on certain conditions (as a change in the cost of living index).
<b>heave</b>	Lift or elevate. <i>She <b>heaved</b> half a brick at him.</i>
<b><u>hoist</u></b>	Lifting device for raising heavy or cumbersome objects. <i>An interest rate <b>hoist</b>.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>Employees on their way up the career <b>ladder</b>.</i>

<b>lift</b>	Lifting device consisting of a platform or cage that is raised and lowered mechanically in a vertical shaft in order to move people from one floor to another in a building. <i><b>Lift</b> the tulip bulbs.</i>
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its <b>mounting</b>.</i>
<b>precipitate</b>	A substance precipitated from a solution. <i>The incident <b>precipitated</b> a political crisis.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>It is hoped that the event will <b>raise</b> 50 000.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise to one s feet. <i><b>Rise</b> to the occasion.</i>
<b>risen</b>	Above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	Advancing or becoming higher or greater in degree or value or status. <i><b>Rising</b> ground.</i>
<b>soar</b>	Fly by means of a hang glider. <i>The gulls <b>soared</b> on the summery winds.</i>
<b>soaring</b>	Flying or rising high in the air. <i>The coloured trails of <b>soaring</b> rockets.</i>
<b>stairs</b>	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
<b>stepladder</b>	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<b>surmount</b>	Overcome (a difficulty or obstacle). <i>The tomb was <b>surmounted</b> by a sculptured angel.</i>
<b>underpin</b>	Support from beneath. <i>The theme of honour <b>underpinning</b> the two books.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	Sloping upwards. <i>He gave mountain biking clinics on handling steep <b>uphills</b>.</i>
<b>upstairs</b>	Situated on an upper floor. <i>The <b>upstairs</b> maid.</i>
<b>upward</b>	Towards a higher place, point, or level. <i>The cards were face <b>upward</b>.</i>
<b>vertically</b>	(with reference to passage of diseases) from one generation to the next. <i>The bacteria are <b>vertically</b> transmitted from mother to offspring.</i>
<b>zoom</b>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The value of these stocks is <b>zooming</b>.</i>
