### **Definitions of "Beckon" as a verb**

- *Summon with a wave, nod, or some other gesture.*
- *Make a gesture with the hand, arm, or head to encourage or instruct someone to approach or follow.*
- *Appear inviting.*
- *Appear attractive or inviting.*

<b>attract</b>	<i>He hoped this strategy would <b>attract</b> foreign investment by multinationals.</i>
<b>bring in</b>	Bring into a different state.
<b>call</b>	Give the calls to the dancers for a square dance. <i>Bluejays <b>called</b> to one another.</i>
<b><u><a href="#">captivate</a></u></b>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was <b>captivated</b> by her beauty.</i>
<b>catch the eye of</b>	Perceive by hearing.
<b><u><a href="#">charm</a></u></b>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>The books have <b>charmed</b> children the world over.</i>

<b><u>coax</u></b>	Obtain something from (someone) by gentle and persistent persuasion. <i>Come on now I <b>coaxed</b>.</i>
<b>draw</b>	Represent by making a drawing of as with a pencil chalk etc on a surface. <b>Draw</b> wire.
<b><u>enchant</u></b>	Fill (someone) with great delight; charm. <i>You have been <b>enchanted</b> by some spirits.</i>
<b><u>engage</u></b>	Engage for service under a term of contract. <i>They <b>engaged</b> in a discussion.</i>
<b><u>entice</u></b>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>A show which should <b>entice</b> a new audience into the theatre.</i>
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>I ve always been <b>fascinated</b> by computers.</i>
<b>gesticulate</b>	Show, express or direct through movement. <i>They were shouting and gesticulating frantically at drivers who did not slow down.</i>
<b>gesture</b>	Express something with a gesture or gestures. <i>He <b>gestured</b> her towards a chair.</i>
<b><u>induce</u></b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner. <i>The current in the primary winding is <b>induced</b> by the rotating magnet.</i>
<b>interest</b>	Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of. <i>I thought the book might <b>interest</b> Eliot.</i>
<b>invite</b>	Invite someone to one s house. <i>We were <b>invited</b> to a dinner at the Embassy.</i>
<b><u>lure</u></b>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>The child was <b>lured</b> into a car but managed to escape.</i>
<b>make a gesture</b>	To compose or represent.
<b>motion</b>	Propose for discussion and resolution at a meeting or legislative assembly. <i>He <b>motioned</b> Dennis to a plush chair.</i>
<b><u>nod</u></b>	Signify or express greeting assent or understanding by nodding. <i>He looked around for support and everyone <b>noded</b>.</i>
<b>persuade</b>	Cause (someone) to believe something, especially after a sustained effort; convince. <i>He did everything he could to <b>persuade</b> the police that he was the robber.</i>

<b>pull</b>	Cause to move by pulling. <i>He <b>pulled</b> himself into the saddle.</i>
<b>pull in</b>	Move into a certain direction.
<b>signal</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>Stone <b>signalled</b> right.</i>
<b>tempt</b>	Have an urge or inclination to do something. <i>The window displays <b>tempted</b> the shoppers.</i>
<b>wave</b>	Set waves in. <i>She <b>waved</b> her gun.</i>

- convoke** Call together or summon (an assembly or meeting).  
*She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.*
- declamation** Vehement oratory.  
*Lines written for a school **declamation**.*
- deportation** The act of expelling a person from their native land.  
*A **deportation** order.*

<b><u>elicit</u></b>	Derive by reason. <i>A corrupt heart <b>elicits</b> in an hour all that is bad in us.</i>
<b><u>entice</u></b>	Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage. <i>The treat is offered to <b>entice</b> the dog to eat.</i>
<b><u>entreat</u></b>	Treat (someone) in a specified manner. <i>The King I fear hath ill <b>entreated</b> her.</i>
<b><u>evoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Akasha is <b>evoked</b> in India when a house is being built to ensure its completion.</i>
<b>extradition</b>	The surrender of an accused or convicted person by one state or country to another (usually under the provisions of a statute or treaty). <i>Emergency <b>extraditions</b>.</i>
<b><u>guest</u></b>	A person staying at a hotel or guest house. <i>He was in Warsaw as a <b>guest</b> of the Polish government.</i>
<b>intercom</b>	An electrical device allowing one-way or two-way communication. <i>The pilot s voice comes over the <b>intercom</b>.</i>
<b>invite</b>	Invite someone to one s house. <i>We <b>invited</b> the neighbors in for a cup of coffee.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Give rise to; evoke. <i>She <b>invoked</b> his help against this attack.</i>
<b><u>mobilize</u></b>	Call to arms; of military personnel. <i>Acid rain <b>mobilizes</b> the aluminium in forest soils.</i>
<b>muster</b>	A formal gathering of troops, especially for inspection, display, or exercise. <i>My father needed help with <b>mustering</b> sheep.</i>
<b>paging</b>	The system of numbering pages. <i>The public address system in the hospital was used for <b>paging</b>.</i>
<b><u>petition</u></b>	Present a petition to an authority in respect of a particular cause. <i>The Act allowed couples to <b>petition</b> for divorce after one year of marriage.</i>
<b><u>reciprocity</u></b>	Mutual exchange of commercial or other privileges. <i>The Community intends to start discussions on <b>reciprocity</b> with third countries.</i>
<b><u>reinstate</u></b>	Bring back into original existence, use, function, or position. <i>The union threatened strike action if Owen was not <b>reinstated</b>.</i>
<b>repast</b>	The food served and eaten at one time. <i>A sumptuous <b>repast</b>.</i>
<b>repatriate</b>	A person who has been repatriated. <i>Foreign firms would be permitted to <b>repatriate</b> all profits.</i>

<b>request</b>	A formal message requesting something that is submitted to an authority. <i>The club's excursion was postponed at the <b>request</b> of some of the members.</i>
<b><u>shout</u></b>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>He was <b>shouted</b> down as he tried to explain the decision.</i>
<b>subpoena</b>	Serve or summon with a subpoena. <i>The decision to <b>subpoena</b> government records.</i>
<b><u>summon</u></b>	Gather or bring together. <i>He <b>summoned</b> a meeting of head delegates.</i>
<b>summons</b>	Serve someone with a summons. <i>He has been <b>summonsed</b> to appear in court next month.</i>
<b>visiting</b>	(of a person) on a visit to a person or place. <i>A <b>visiting</b> professor.</i>
<b>warrant</b>	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>An extradition <b>warrant</b>.</i>
<b>writ</b>	A piece or body of writing. <i>The two reinstated officers issued a <b>writ</b> for libel against the applicants.</i>
<b><u>yell</u></b>	An organized cheer, especially one used to support a sports team. <i>You heard me losing my temper and <b>yelling</b> at her.</i>
