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## Associations of "Bedtime" (30 Words)

<a href="#">afternoon</a>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I ll be back at three in the <b>afternoon</b>.</i>
<a href="#">awake</a>	Stop sleeping; wake from sleep. <i>Still not fully <b>awake</b>.</i>
<b>awaken</b>	Make someone aware of (something) for the first time. <i>They were <b>awakened</b> to the sad facts.</i>
<b>bed</b>	A bedroom. <i>She is grooming the horses and <b>bedding</b> them down for the night.</i>
<b>conscious</b>	Having knowledge of something. <i>Became <b>conscious</b> that he was being followed.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	An opening time period. <i>It <b>dawned</b> on him that she had betrayed him.</i>
<b>day</b>	A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>They only met a few <b>days</b> ago.</i>
<a href="#">dream</a>	Experience dreams during sleep. <i>I had a <b>dream</b> about you last night.</i>
<a href="#">dreaming</a>	Imaginative thoughts indulged in while awake.
<b>insomnia</b>	Habitual sleeplessness; inability to sleep.
<b>kindergarten</b>	(in North America) a class or school that prepares children, usually five- or six-year-olds, for the first year of formal education.
<b>lunchtime</b>	The time in the middle of the day when lunch is eaten. <i>The <b>lunchtime</b> television news.</i>
<a href="#">midnight</a>	12 o'clock at night; the middle of the night. <i>I left at <b>midnight</b>.</i>
<a href="#">morning</a>	Every morning. <i><b>Mornings</b> she d sleep late.</i>

<b>nap</b>	A card game similar to whist; usually played for stakes. <i>There wasn't time for a <b>nap</b>.</i>
<b>night</b>	The night as the interval between two days. <i>I had a restless <b>night</b>.</i>
<b>nightmare</b>	A very unpleasant or frightening experience or prospect. <i>Developing thunderclouds are a balloonist's worst <b>nightmare</b>.</i>
<b>noon</b>	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>oversleep</b>	Sleep longer or later than one intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She was <b>roused</b> from a deep sleep by a hand on her shoulder.</i>
<b>sleep</b>	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>A good night's <b>sleep</b>.</i>
<b>sleeper</b>	A sleeping car, or a berth in one. <i>The winner was a true <b>sleeper</b> no one expected him to get it.</i>
<b>sleepless</b>	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness Shakespeare. <i>Lisa lay <b>sleepless</b>.</i>
<b>slumber</b>	A sleep. <i>Scaring folk from their <b>slumbers</b>.</i>
<b>sunday</b>	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
<b>tonight</b>	The present or immediately coming night. <i><b>Tonight</b> is a night to remember.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i><b>Wakes</b> weeks.</i>
<b>wakeful</b>	Marked by full consciousness or alertness. <i><b>Wakeful</b> nights.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>She knew he would <b>waken</b> in an hour or so.</i>
<b>waking</b>	Marked by full consciousness or alertness. <i>Days of danger and nights of <b>waking</b>.</i>
