Associations of "Bedtime" (30 Words)

afternoon	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I ll be back at three in the afternoon.</i>
awake	Stop sleeping; wake from sleep. <i>Still not fully awake.</i>
awaken	Make someone aware of (something) for the first time. <i>They were awakened to the sad facts.</i>
bed	A bedroom. <i>She is grooming the horses and bedding them down for the night.</i>
conscious	Having knowledge of something. <i>Became conscious that he was being followed.</i>
dawn	An opening time period. <i>It dawned on him that she had betrayed him.</i>
day	A day assigned to a particular purpose or observance. <i>They only met a few days ago.</i>
dream	Experience dreams during sleep. <i>I had a dream about you last night.</i>
dreaming	Imaginative thoughts indulged in while awake.
insomnia	Habitual sleeplessness; inability to sleep.
kindergarten	(in North America) a class or school that prepares children, usually five- or six-year-olds, for the first year of formal education.
lunchtime	The time in the middle of the day when lunch is eaten. <i>The lunchtime television news.</i>
midnight	12 o'clock at night; the middle of the night. <i>I left at midnight.</i>
morning	Every morning. <i>Mornings she d sleep late.</i>

nap	A card game similar to whist; usually played for stakes. <i>There wasn't time for a nap.</i>
night	The night as the interval between two days. <i>I had a restless night.</i>
nightmare	A very unpleasant or frightening experience or prospect. <i>Developing thunderclouds are a balloonist's worst nightmare.</i>
noon	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve noon.</i>
oversleep	Sleep longer or later than one intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She was roused from a deep sleep by a hand on her shoulder.</i>
sleep	Be in a state of sleep be asleep. <i>A good night's sleep.</i>
sleeper	A sleeping car, or a berth in one. <i>The winner was a true sleeper no one expected him to get it.</i>
sleepless	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness Shakespeare. <i>Lisa lay sleepless.</i>
slumber	A sleep. <i>Scaring folk from their slumbers.</i>
sunday	United States evangelist (1862-1935).
tonight	The present or immediately coming night. <i>Tonight is a night to remember.</i>
wake	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>Wakes weeks.</i>
wakeful	Marked by full consciousness or alertness. <i>Wakeful nights.</i>
waken	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>She knew he would waken in an hour or so.</i>
waking	Marked by full consciousness or alertness. <i>Days of danger and nights of waking.</i>
