- Ahead of time; in anticipation.
- Before an action or event; in advance.

<u>ahead</u>	Leading or ahead in a competition. When you pay <b>ahead</b> or in advance you receive a discount.
antecedence	Preceding in time.
antedate	Establish something as being earlier relative to something else. There are no references to him that would <b>antedate</b> his birth.
anterior	Of or near the head end or toward the front plane of a body. The veins <b>anterior</b> to the heart.
before	In front of someone or something. They began trotting through the city with guards running <b>before</b> and behind.



betimes	Before the usual or expected time; early. Next morning I was up <b>betimes</b> .
<u>early</u>	Being or occurring at an early stage of development. We agreed to meet at 6 am to get an <b>early</b> start.
first	The first or highest in an ordering or series. Was <b>first</b> in her class.
<u>forego</u>	Be earlier in time; go back further.
<u>former</u>	Denoting the first or first mentioned of two people or things. <i>Our <b>former</b> glory.</i>
formerly	At a previous time. The building <b>formerly</b> housed the National Assembly.
<u>forward</u>	Forward in time or order or degree. The scientists are <b>forward</b> ing the development of biotechnology.
<u>front</u>	Relating to or located in the front. <i>He sealed the envelope and wrote on the</i> <b>front</b> .
introductory	Serving as an introduction to a subject or topic; basic or preliminary. Began the slide show with some <b>introductory</b> remarks.
known	Apprehended with certainty. A musician <b>known</b> throughout the world.
outdistance	Go far ahead of. He <b>outdistance</b> d the other runners.
<u>precede</u>	Come before (something) in time. A gun battle had <b>precede</b> d the explosions.
precedence	The condition of being considered more important than someone or something else; priority in importance, order, or rank. <i>His desire for power soon took precedence over any other consideration.</i>
<u>preceding</u>	Existing or coming before. <i>The <b>preceding</b> pages.</i>
precursory	Warning of future misfortune. <b>Precursory</b> seismic activity.
predate	Come before. These mammals <b>predate</b> certain eggs.
prefatory	Serving as an introduction; introductory. In his <b>prefatory</b> remarks the author claims that.
<u>premature</u>	Occurring or done before the usual or proper time; too early. A <b>premature</b> judgment.



prematurely	Before the due time; ahead of time. <b>Prematurely</b> grey hair.
previous	Previous convictions a criminal record. I admit I may have been a bit <b>previous</b> .
previously	At an earlier time or formerly. Museums and art galleries which had <b>previously</b> been open to the public.
<u>prior</u>	The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot. <i>He had no juvenile record no <b>prior</b>s.</i>
<u>priority</u>	The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. The safety of the country takes <b>priority</b> over any other matter.
untimely	Uncommonly early or before the expected time. The moment was very <b>untimely</b> chosen.
