Definitions of "Beforehand" as an adjective

Definitions of "Beforehand" as an adverb

- *Ahead of time; in anticipation.*
- *Before an action or event; in advance.*

Synonyms of "Beforehand" as an adverb (4 Words)

ahead Leading or ahead in a competition.
Ahead by two pawns.

ahead of time Ahead of time in anticipation.

in advance To or toward the inside of.

in readiness To or toward the inside of.

Usage Examples of "Beforehand" as an adverb

- *Should have made reservations beforehand.*
- *Rooms must be booked beforehand.*

Associations of "Beforehand" (30 Words)

above An earlier section of a written text.
See *above*.

ahead Leading or ahead in a competition.
When you pay *ahead* or in advance you receive a discount.

antecedence Preceding in time.

antedate Establish something as being earlier relative to something else.
There are no references to him that would *antedate* his birth.

anterior Of or near the head end or toward the front plane of a body.
The veins *anterior* to the heart.

before In front of someone or something.
They began trotting through the city with guards running *before* and behind.

betimes	Before the usual or expected time; early. <i>Next morning I was up betimes.</i>
early	Being or occurring at an early stage of development. <i>We agreed to meet at 6 am to get an early start.</i>
first	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>Was first in her class.</i>
forego	Be earlier in time; go back further.
former	Denoting the first or first mentioned of two people or things. <i>Our former glory.</i>
formerly	At a previous time. <i>The building formerly housed the National Assembly.</i>
forward	Forward in time or order or degree. <i>The scientists are forwarding the development of biotechnology.</i>
front	Relating to or located in the front. <i>He sealed the envelope and wrote on the front.</i>
introductory	Serving as an introduction to a subject or topic; basic or preliminary. <i>Began the slide show with some introductory remarks.</i>
known	Apprehended with certainty. <i>A musician known throughout the world.</i>
outdistance	Go far ahead of. <i>He outdistanced the other runners.</i>
precede	Come before (something) in time. <i>A gun battle had preceded the explosions.</i>
precedence	The condition of being considered more important than someone or something else; priority in importance, order, or rank. <i>His desire for power soon took precedence over any other consideration.</i>
preceding	Existing or coming before. <i>The preceding pages.</i>
precursory	Warning of future misfortune. <i>Precursory seismic activity.</i>
predate	Come before. <i>These mammals predate certain eggs.</i>
prefatory	Serving as an introduction; introductory. <i>In his prefatory remarks the author claims that.</i>
premature	Occurring or done before the usual or proper time; too early. <i>A premature judgment.</i>

prematurely	Before the due time; ahead of time. <i>Prematurely grey hair.</i>
previous	Previous convictions a criminal record. <i>I admit I may have been a bit previous.</i>
previously	At an earlier time or formerly. <i>Museums and art galleries which had previously been open to the public.</i>
prior	The head of a religious order in an abbey the prior is next below the abbot. <i>He had no juvenile record no priors.</i>
priority	The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. <i>The safety of the country takes priority over any other matter.</i>
untimely	Uncommonly early or before the expected time. <i>The moment was very untimely chosen.</i>
